MOSES MARSHALL.

Moses Marshall died at his home, 624 East Third street, this morning at 3:15 o'clock, aged 94 years, 8 months and 12 days.

Moses Marshall was born in Virginia April 4th, 1811. While he lived at various times in Ohio, Illinois and Missouri, the major portion of his life has been spent in Kansas, he having lived in and around Cherryvale for the past thirty-five years.

Mr. Marshall has been ill and ailing for the past five months, but took to his bed only three weeks ago. During those three weeks he has not been able to sit up or move around without assistance, but has not complained, bearing his illness as only a true Christian could.

Mr. Marshall is survived by his wife and ten children: Mrs. C. C. Kincaid, Mrs. F. J. Straub, Mrs. C. R. Barrow, all of Cherryvale, Mrs. Nellie M. Wells of Los Angeles, Mrs. Ann Menager of Leavenworth, Stephen D. of Kansas City, Moses H., living south of this city, C. M. of Cherokee, John B. Marshall of Bandon, Or. and Mrs. W. C. Powell who is now at Bandon, Or. with her brother.

The funeral service will be held from the family residence Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, the Rev. Robbins of the Methodist church, of which Mrs. Marshall has been a member since her sixteenth year, officiating.

Mr. Marshall was an upright and a Godly man, one whose equal is seldom met with. It is said of him and it is true, that he never in all his almost ninety-five years on this earth, intentionally wronged a human being; he was considerate, kind and affectionate; he was generous to a fault; never was there anything needed to be done for anyone but what he was always found willing and anxious to do. He was a Christian in every sense of the word, and emulated the example of the Great Teacher, in so far as it was possible for human to do.

His absence from the family circle will be hard to bear, but the burden is nothing by the consciousness that he has gone to the Great Beyond for his reward, such a reward as he most assuredly deserves. In this city, there can be found no man, woman or child, who can truthfully say that Moses Marshall ever did anything, or said a word, to hurt anyone; everyone who knew him instinctively loved him, and it is not only in his home where he will be missed—the grief elsewhere is as great. Truly, a good man, and a Christian man, has left us to go to his Maker.—Cherryvale (Kansas) Journal.
