A telephone meeting was held at Parkersburg last Saturday and a committee of three, J. L. Kronenberg, Frank Finn and Thomas Davenport, were appointed to see what could be done in the way of securing subscribers for new local lines. It is proposed to run several lines, taking in Bandon, Parkersburg, Bear Creek, Cody's Camp, Ashton's, Prosper, and one line on the north side of the river taking in Bullard's, and out as far as the Flanagan ranch. The system now proposed is that of the Pacific States Co., whereby the latter company furnishes the phones at a rental of \$6.00 per annum. We understand this charge does not include any service over their line, the only advantage being that a subscriber could connect direct with the long distance by paying the usual fee.

Portland After Coquille Trade.

New Steamer Will Probably be Put on Portland-Bandon Run.
Chas. E. Steelsmith, of Portland, representing some of the shippers of that city, was in town Saturday and remained until Monday, looking over the resources and general business outlook here with a view of putting a steamer on this run. He expects to return to Portland Saturday and make his report, and thinks the matter will be decided a week after the latter.

His proposition is to put on a small boat of about 100 to 150 tons register and ten ft draft. Bandon would be made the southern headquarters of the company, although trips would be extended to Port Orford when there was business in sight. Stops would also be made at Yaquina Bay and Tillamook. The passenger business would also be catered to, as the boat leaving Bandon direct for Yaquina would give passengers a chance to proceed via rail to Portland, and give a 24-hour service and be very popular with the traveling public. Not only this, but it would give people up the coast a chance to visit the famous Bandon Beach this summer.

Mr. Steelsmith was very favorably impressed with Bandon and the Coquille river country. Of course, Portland would be no market for our lumber except Port Orford cedar, but he says they could use all the match-wood that was offered. Portland is also a good market for our dairy products, and coal could be marketed there if offered at a reasonable price. Communication with Portland would mean a considerable reduction in the price of mill feed and flour, and would make it possible for the wholesalers there to compete with San Francisco in all lines of merchandise.

It is proposed to give a ten-day service, and the boat would be put on the run in March. It is to be hoped that the gentlemen back of this proposition mean business and will establish a service that will become permanent and can be depended upon. The trouble heretofore with the Portland boats has been that they were too uncertain and shippers lost confidence in them. The business is here and the steamer that will do the right thing can get plenty of it.

Captain of Sloop Gets Ten Years.
New York, Jan. 27.—Van Schick, commander of the ill-fated excursion steamer Sloop, was found guilty of the charge of criminal negligence in failing to keep his crew properly drilled for a fire emergency. Van Schick was sentenced to ten years at hard labor in Sing Sing.

Evans will act as director, and the season opens April 7th, with Oakland at Los Angeles, Seattle at San Francisco, and Portland at Fresno. Mike Fisher will manage the Fresno team.

Miner Killed.
Robert Walker, a native of Scotland, aged 37 years, was killed in the Beaver Hill mine, yesterday, by being caught under a falling mass where he was at work. His head was crushed and he lived about half an hour. Coroner Mingus went to Beaver Hill but did not consider an inquest necessary. So far as known, the man had no family.

Experting the Experts.

County Court Suspects Work of Cruisers.
The Daily Coast Mail of Jan. 30th prints the following:
Messrs. Roberts, county surveyor of Douglas, and Edwards, a timber cruiser by profession, were recently employed by the county court of Coos to cruise the timber land of this county. The report of these gentlemen was later sent to the court accompanied by a bill for \$2,500 for their services. The report was so manifestly incorrect, one section visible from the courthouse itself, and covered with timber, being reported as barren, being an instance, that the court refused to pay the bill. In anticipation of suit for the money by Roberts and Edwards, Jas Cowan was appointed by the court to re-cruise the territory. He has just completed the work and the two reports show most astonishing discrepancies, the section mentioned before as having been reported barren of timber, showing 19 million feet. The suspicion is gaining ground that the cruisers first employed used a portion of an old report in their possession and drew on their imagination for the remainder.

Coppin's Body Found.

Death Was by Drowning. No Evidence of Foul Play.
The body of Marion Coppin, who has been missing since January first and about whose disappearance there had been a dense cloud of mystery, with much talk of foul play, was found about 12:30 p.m. yesterday, floating near the old landing on the Bay City point, by Thomas Buckman and Wm. Blackmore, who were passing in a boat. Coroner Mingus was at once notified and proceeded to the scene with the launch Teddy, bringing the body to town where it was deposited in the morgue. In spite of the length of time that the body had been in the water, it was in an excellent state of preservation.

Examination of the body disclosed the fact that Coppin came to his death by drowning, there being no marks whatever to indicate that he had been the victim of any violence there not being even an abrasion of the skin. While this leaves still the question of whether the man's death was a case of accident or suicide, it happily eliminates the darker suspicion; and it may be said that those best acquainted with the young man and the circumstances, positively reject the theory of suicide.—Coast Mail.

Jasper Jennings to Hang.

Grant's Pass, Jan. 26.—Jasper Jennings, convicted of the murder of his father, N. M. Jennings, at Granite Hill, September 7th, Thursday morning was sentenced to hang Friday, March 9th.

When called before Judge Hanna, Jasper calmly stood and heard his death sentence. He showed far more nerve than when the announcement of the jury's verdict was made last week. The boy had nothing to say, other than that he was not guilty.

After being out 24 hours, the jury trying the case against Dora Jennings was recalled after making the announcement of their inability to agree, and were dismissed. The last ballot stood seven for acquittal and five for conviction.
