BANDON BY THE SEA.

Bandon is destined to be one of the most important sea ports on the Oregon coast. The Coquille valley is one of the richest in the state in natural resources. The principal timber resources of Coos county are tributary to the Coquille river. Our immense coal fields are yet practically undeveloped and there is no better dairying section in the Pacific Northwest.

When these industries are fully developed it is plain to be seen what the effect will be to Coquille shipping. No great expense will be needed to complete the projected government improvements at the bar. The work now in progress should be carried on to completion without interruption. The government gains nothing by expending large sums for preparatory work and then letting it go to decay. With the jetty completed and a small amount of dredging, the Coquille shipping will increase with surprising rapidity. We have the resources; we have the harbor. A steamer leaving the Bandon docks is on the broad Pacific in ten minutes, something that can be accomplished in very few ports. No effort is being made to create a boom or mushroom growth at Bandon. All we ask is a fair and conservative investigation of our resources and prospects by anyone looking for a location for the investment of capital. We have no fear of the result. Bandon is the only town in Coos county that is out of debt and has money in the treasury.

Bill for Dredger Introduced.
Congressman Hermann has introduced a bill in the House for the appropriation of the sum of one hundred and twenty thousand dollars, for the construction, equipment, and operation of a combination dredge, with dipper and suction appliances, with necessary scows, to be used upon the bars and inside harbors of the following navigable waters in the State of Oregon: Coos Bay, including Coos River, Tillamook Bay, Yaquina Bay, Siuslaw River, Coquille River, Nehalem River, the Umpqua River and Rogue River, to be used at said harbors as the necessity may require.

Washington, Feb. 3.—Senator Fulton today called upon the chief of engineers and presented a memorial from the citizens of Bandon asking for an appropriation of \$55,000 for work on the lower channel and mouth of Coquille river. This appropriation is desired for the purpose of continuing the construction of the jetty, and more particularly that portion of it constructed during the past year, some 850 feet in length. It is particularly needed, and if not completed it is feared the trestle will be destroyed by the storms, or the rock already placed will spread by the action of tides and storms, involving extra expense when the construction is continued, if not undertaken soon. It is also reported that there are shoals in the first bend of the river above Bandon, on which loaded vessels ground, and which is a serious obstacle to navigation.
Senator Fulton was of the opinion that the chief engineer had an emergency fund from which the expenditure could be made to cover the request, but was advised that this fund was exhausted.
Chief Engineer Mackenzie states that he cannot make a recommendation at this session of Congress for the appropriation desired, as the case is one of many hundred, and his recommendation would be without avail, as there is to be no general rivers and harbors bill. The only work in Oregon which General Mackenzie will recommend for special appropriation, is the Columbia river improvements.
