The steamer was put on the run as a trial, it being doubted at the time whether the traffic from this place would justify the expense of her operation. The boat is particularly adapted to carrying miscellaneous freights, and without a liberal patronage in that line of business, her continuance on this route would appear to be a poor business investment. The Breakwater is one of the best accommodation boats which visit this port, and her removal would be a rather hard knock to Coos Bay.—Coast Mail.

### \$28,000,000 to Be Expended on Another Big Railroad.

### Coast Road from San Francisco or Eureka to Portland via Eugene With Main Stem Stretching Across Central Oregon.

A railroad system, the main line of which will be 1,280 miles long, forming a gigantic letter T, the main stem stretching across central Oregon and the arms reaching up and down the coast line from Portland to San Francisco—that is Oregon's newest transportation victory. Construction of such a road will be begun immediately, involving an expenditure of \$28,000,000, and backed by men with \$300,000,000 at their command.

At the head of the enterprise, not as figureheads, but for actual financing and construction, are men well known in the world of railway affairs. A few who can be mentioned at this time are J. L. Greatainger, New York, ex president of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit company; Senator William H. Lynn, New York; Baker & Crabtree, St. Louis bankers, connected with the trust companies there in which brewers' capital is largely invested. Within the next 30 days they will complete the organization in Oregon of a corporation that will be known as the Oregon Coast & Eastern Railway Company, and this corporation will take over the entire project, which is now in the hands of a syndicate made up of the men named and their Wall street associates.

A representative of this project was in Bandon Tuesday evening and left on the stage for Port Orford and Gold Beach. He says there will be "something doing" in a very short time.

Bandon will probably be a division point as the location is ideal. There is plenty of good level ground high and dry for railroad yards. We have an abundance of coal and one of the best harbors on the coast. Keep your eye on Bandon and you'll see us grow.

### Surveyors at Eureka.

Eureka, Cal., Jan. 27.—A party of railroad surveyors who started from Drain, Or., two years ago, arrived today. At the head of the party is E. C. Cooper, and while it is not definitely known, it is believed he is in the employ of the Southern Pacific. It has been reported that he has been surveying the Coos Bay branch of the Southern Pacific.

Mr. Cooper said tonight he had nothing to give out for publication beyond that his work had been carried up to the present point very satisfactorily. The main crew is encamped at Stone Lagoon, 30 miles north of Eureka.

It is reported that another new steamer will be built for the Coquille trade, with a carrying capacity of half a million feet.

A dispatch from Marshfield to the Oregonian, dated Jan. 29th, says: Messrs. Roberts and Edwards, professional timber cruisers, were recently employed to cruise Coos county for assessment rolls. The report was sent in to the last county court with a bill of \$1,800. The court turned the bill down and employed James Cowan of Marshfield. His report on the section reported barren in sight of the court house, showed 12,000,000 feet. The cruisers probably used the old reports and guessed at the remainder.

The cruisers referred to in the above dispatch are County Surveyor C. E. Roberts and Oscar Edwards of this city. The impression conveyed in the dispatch that the work was not properly nor accurately performed is false in every particular.

"Our estimate of the Coos county timber net with the unqualified approval of the county assessor," said Mr. Roberts to a Review reporter today. "It was at the assessor's request that we did not estimate the section mentioned in the dispatch as being in sight of the court house and containing 12,000,000 feet of timber. The assessor wished to place the value on that section himself, because its close proximity to the city warranted a higher valuation than we could have fixed.

"I consider the refusal of the Coos county court to allow our bill the result of spite work on the part of one of the county commissioners, who strenuously objected to hiring me and Mr. Edwards in the first place, because a lot of jealous cruisers in Coos county were after the job. The other commissioner and the county judge favored us however, and they seemed to be satisfied with our work.

"In presenting our report to the county court," continued Mr. Roberts, "we explained that we had estimated only good, sound, merchantable timber, making allowance for disadvantageous locations. I presume an attempt will be made now to discredit our estimate by adding to our figures all of the unsound, unmerchantable timber that in justice to the owners we omitted.

"We will make another peaceable effort to collect our bill," said Mr. Roberts, "and if we fail we will take the matter into the courts."
