Taxpaying Time.

The annual taxpaying season is with us again. The law provides for payments to begin on Feb. 15th, and a rehearsal of the provisions of the tax laws now in effect as to time and terms of payment may not be amiss: If you pay your taxes, in full, on or before March 15, 1906, you will be allowed a rebate of three per cent. If you pay your taxes between March 15th and the first Monday in April you will not receive the rebate, neither will there be added penalties and interest. You may pay half of your taxes on or before the first Monday in April, and then have until including the first Monday in October, 1906, to pay the second half thereof. In case at least one half of your taxes are not paid on or before the first Monday in April, the entire tax becomes delinquent, and the law compels a charge of 10 per cent penalty, and interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum on the tax until paid.

Boy Uses Knife.

Nortland Journal.

Myrtle Point, Or., Feb. 9.—A stabbing affray occurred here Monday in which Owen Rackleff, aged 13, was wounded by Harold Adams, aged 12. The boys have quarreled frequently of late. Sunday the Rackleff boy punched young Adams for calling him names. When the boys met the next day, Adams plunged his pocket knife in Rackleff's left arm above the elbow, inflicting a bad wound, requiring several stitches by the surgeon. The boy came near bleeding to death. This is the third stabbing affray among the boys of this place lately.

McCurdy to Quit America.

New York, Feb. 9.—Stung to bitter resentment by the criticism heaped upon him in connection with the insurance scandals, Richard A. McCurdy, former president of the Mutual Life, has decided to quit America. He has dismissed all the servants from his palatial residence, Morris-town, N. J., and March 1st the mansion will be closed. Shortly thereafter he will shake the dust of New York from his feet, and join in Paris that distinguished group of ex insurance potentates which includes James Hagen Hyde, of Equitable fame, and Judge Andrew Hamilton.

Louis A. Thiebaut, McCurdy's son-in-law, and formerly general agent for the Mutual, has also arranged to make his home in Paris with his wife and family.

New Town on the Umpqua.

Articles of incorporation of the Reedsport company have been filed with the county clerk of Douglas county. The incorporators are W. P. Reed of Gardiner, W. H. Jamieson of Roseburg, and Joseph Lyons of Portland. The capital stock is placed at \$140,000. The object of the company, as stated in the articles, is to engage in the real estate, mercantile, sawmill, and steamboat business. Their immediate plans, however, are the platting and placing on the market the townsite of Reedsport, which is about a mile and a half southeast of Gardiner, and on the line of the proposed Drain and Coos Bay railroad, the route of the new road not passing through the town of Gardiner.

Parkersburg.

There was excitement for a night or two over the Washington race at Bandon, not that I mean to insinuate "a rough house" was on, for Parkersburg men are gentlemen and therefore behave as such, but one coming seemed necessary to the climax that is reached when the finish of anything takes place. When all was over and the return made possible we gathered in the cabin of the Wasps, talking, and watching the preparations such as lighting of the side-lights I was doing and the chief's manipulation of machinery. I remember throwing down the match which caused the mischief, after the lighting of the second side-light. It was a foolish thing to do, as the sequel proved. Instantly that miserable match caused a wholesale blaze. It is amazing how some matches will burn, and others, when one wants them to, will not. Then the commotion began. The minds of all were in this instance of one mind. Had room been ours all would have scattered, but as dimensions were limited within the bounds of the cabin the passengers went on a mad dash toward the companion-way; speed was checked when the jam took place. Memorably I was last, not because of bravery but through forced circumstances. Had I been on deck with plenty of sea-room I might be off the California coast by now, so fearful am I of fire. I seldom indulge in personalities but trust in being allowed to give two credits: one belongs to Parkersburg; the other to Bandon. Mr. Hansen of our camp manfully played the Dispatch hose upon the fire from forward fighting successfully to save the gasoline tank. Several times he was driven back but renewed the fight and helped save the craft. It seemed to me after the first stroke of the fire bell, two things did not stamp before the Bandon boys had a good stream playing from at least one boiler. It was good executive ability and cool judgment displayed, and I have come to this conclusion, that the fire brand will not succeed when such an opponent as the Bandon fire brigade faces it. Parkersburg, by that act, allowed her feelings toward Bandon to verge dangerously near love, being a state very pleasant to contemplate.

Since my return, during an absence of two years upon the high seas and higher mountains, I have noticed changes within your city and all along the line from the Point to the extreme end of the north jetty. Our river is becoming such an important factor of commerce that it seems but right a part of the donation from Congress going northward might be expended in widening the steamers' pathway of unobstructed going and deepening the channel and placing channel buoys occasionally where most needed. If the ratio of coin as tips to Congressional Pages was placed on buoys the channel would be policed effectively and serve to ease the minds of navigators.

In speaking of that pale and lovely orb, the moon, I wonder how many of our people witnessed the wonderful sight of the 8th, when she went into shadow, causing a total eclipse and lasting nearly two hours from time of entrance to exit from shadow. I was fortunate in seeing the sight and much impressed thereby. An ideal place I discovered in the middle of the slope of the building overlooking the head of the river. Stars overhead cast their reflections in the placid depths while on either side the hills, tempered of their ruggedness, seemed to fade from greater to less shades of darkness as from the base one glanced to the summit where they seemed to touch the canopy of heaven. In years to come one can look back, sidled by memory, to that time and become renewed in spirit to battle with this world of ours.
