Taxes for 1905.
In 1905, the taxes paid into the State fund by Coos county was \$12,687.50, or \$8,129 less than paid in 1904.
The total tax value of the county for 1905 was \$29,239,778.33; as compared to \$3,676,147.66; the value of taxable property in 1904, or an increase in value of \$5,563,630.66; in the year 1905 over that of 1904.
The State, county and general school tax levy of 12 mills for 1905 amounted to \$110,877.34 or an increase of \$592.91 on a levy of 18 mills less than for the year 1904.
The special city tax levy of 5 mills for Bandon in 1905 amounted to \$910.53.
The special city tax levy of 5 mills for Coquille in 1905 amounted to \$1,751.47.
The special city tax levy of 3 mills for Marshfield in 1905 amounted to \$2,712.58.
The special city tax levy of 10 mills for Myrtle Point in 1905 amounted to \$2,730.44.
The special city tax levy of 5 mills for North Bend in 1905 amounted to \$2,901.53.
From this it can be gathered that the value of city property as assessed in 1904 and 1905 in the various cities of the county is as follows:
