2. We further assert that it is the policy of the Democrats of this county that our country shall be, in all things, administered with rigid economy, equality, and without partiality, fear or favor by our county officials.

And we condemn as extravagant the conduct of the Sheriff and Clerk's office for the past two years, whereby the county funds have been expended for the hire of extra employees therein, when the work thereof could and should have been performed by the Sheriff and Clerk and their deputies.

We likewise condemn as partiality and inequality the diverting of the road funds of this county to the improvement of a few particular roads, and leaving the majority of the road districts of this county without any funds whatever for the improvement of their roads.

And we believe that equality, fairness and a square deal demand that the road funds of the county should be apportioned among all of the various road districts of the county, whereby each should have its just proportion thereof.
