PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, the Secretary of State of the State of Oregon has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled "An Act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of Section 1 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder, and providing penalties for violations of provisions of this act," approved February 24, 1903, the People's Power League of Oregon duly filed in his office on February 24, 1906, an initiative petition containing 8,327 signatures properly attached to a copy of said measure, certified in accordance with the provisions of said act, and the said Secretary of State has notified me that the said measure, which said proposed amendment is hereinafter particularly set forth, NOW, THEREFORE, I, Geo. E. Chamberlain, Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to the provisions of said act, hereby do hereby first mentioned, do hereby make and issue this Proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon, announcing that the People's Power League of Oregon has filed said initiative petition with the requisite number of signatures thereto attached demanding that there be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular election to be held on the 4th day of June, 1906, said day being the first Monday in said month, a proposed amendment to Sections 1 and 2 of Article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, designated by said League as a Constitutional amendment providing method of amending Constitution and applying the referendum to all laws affecting constitutional conventions and amendments," which said proposed amendment is hereinafter particularly set forth.

"Section 1. Any amendment or amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be proposed in either branch of the legislative assembly, and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment or amendments, shall, with the yeas and nays thereon, be entered in their journals and referred by the secretary of state to the people for their approval or rejection, at the next regular general election, except when the initiative method is used, in which case a special election for that purpose. If a majority of the electors voting on any such amendment shall vote in favor thereof, it shall thereby become a part of this Constitution. The votes for and against such amendment, or amendments, shall be submitted in the manner aforesaid to the voters of this state at the same election, they shall be so submitted that each amendment shall be voted on separately. No convention shall be called to amend or propose amendments to this Constitution, or to propose a new Constitution, unless the law providing for such convention shall first be approved by the people on a referendum vote at a regular general election. This article shall not be construed to impair the right of the people to amend this Constitution by vote upon an initiative petition therefor."

Done at the Capitol of Salem, this 28th day of February, A. D. 1906.

Port Orford Letter.

For the past week I have seen several of your Bandon citizens registered at the Knapp Hotel. I thought I would send you a few items from here. Mr. Garotte whom I had the pleasure of meeting, speaks highly of your spicy paper and its enterprising editor and gave me much news about your pretty little city and his description of it has persuaded me to make you a visit in the near future.

Our town is full of people and Louis Knapp's hotel is crowded with strangers from all over the coast.

Our steambark wharf has been put in splendid condition by the company's agents, Mr. Luevve, Mr. Dean, ex-sheriff of Jackson county, is doing the work.

Mr. Knapp has lately had his big hotel put in fine shape for the many he expects the coming season. It is a lovely home like place for tourists and he tells me that he does not intend to be outdone in anything that will make it pleasant for his guests. R. D. Hume passed through here last week and he said he was surprised and pleased to see the many improvements made since his last visit. His smiling face was welcomed by all classes of people for his many generous and noble qualities. It is well known that he has spent large sums to help build up Curry county, employing hundreds of men and paying them in hard cash thousands of dollars, and if he had a few more just such men, Curry county would be the most prosperous county in the state; as it, we are not much behind in mineral, stock, and fine broad acres of land.

Look at Port Orford today; one of the finest harbors on the coast, and when we have a jetty or breakwater, large steamers can come in any time as a harbor of refuge.

Port Orford has three large stores, all doing a large business, two hotels, both full, fine schools, churches, and an enterprising paper, edited by Frank Stewart and son. We have telephones, mail from Bandon, Gold Beach and Roseburg every day, and large pack trains carrying supplies to the mines.

Dr. Green is very popular. He drives a spanking bay team and is always ready when the telephone rings.

Attorney Jensen has gone to Portland in the interests of his clients before the Federal court. The United States Marshal is here, and will be about thirty witnesses on account of some land fraud.

Annes Johnson, the popular county school snt. and post master, gave last night an entertainment to raise funds to paint the school house. The hall was crowded. Walter Sinton, ex-editor, with his family, attended. One of his daughters, May, made a speech on women's rights. It was a rouser and brought the house down with cheers. He also played organ, accompanied by Miss Bertha Sloan of Grant's Park, Olla Post, Violet White, and Annie Fromm of this place, "Lead Kindly Light," "America" and "Star Spangled Banner," which was loudly applauded. Mrs. Alce Zumwalt took the prize as the best lady masker.

There's much talk of the new railroad and when we hear the engine toot then we will know it is here.
