The loss was about \$1,500. The owners are very much pleased with the work done by the fire company, and it is difficult to estimate the great damage that would have occurred if it had not been for their efficient work.—Coquille Sentinel.

Town Board Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the town of Bandon, was held in the city council room last Saturday night. The president and entire board were present. The following bills were allowed and warrants drawn for same:

 It was ordered that the county surveyor be employed to survey, locate and set grade stakes for Atwater street. The street as in use now is on private property, and as the plank road has become unsafe for heavy loaded vehicles and must be rebuilt, it has been decided to have it built where it properly belongs. The street runs on the north side of the Rosa and Kime buildings.
 It was also ordered that a survey be made for the purpose of extending First street through Breakwater addition to the sea-wall. When this street is opened up it will make it possible to go direct to the beach from the business part of town.

Peterson Coal Mine at River-ton to be Operated.

We understand that San Francisco capital has been interested in the Peterson mine and that it is to be operated on a large scale. Parties from the city were on the river last week and it is said that they will invest about \$30,000 to increase the output of the mine. There is a good 4-foot vein and the coal is of excellent quality. It is proposed to build two large barges with a carrying capacity of 500 tons each, which will be operated by their own power, and bring the coal to Bandon where it will be put aboard ocean going vessels. Vessels from San Francisco will be put on the run especially for the coal trade and capable of carrying at least 1000 tons of coal.
 The men behind the enterprise are expected back in about ten days to complete arrangements for commencing work.
 This is a move in the right direction. The Coquille valley has plenty of good coal that will find a ready market in the California cities and all that is needed is capital to develop the industry.

Repeal Timber Act.

The senate public lands committee has authorized a favorable report upon the Hansbrough bill to repeal the timber and stone act, amending it, however, in many important particulars. The bill as amended, and which probably will pass the senate, repeals the timber and stone act, and provides that hereafter lands, chiefly valuable for timber, shall be appraised and sold by the secretary of agriculture at public or private sale to the highest bidder. Ten per cent of the profits shall be given to the states, to be expended on public roads and for the benefit of public schools in counties in which the timber is sold, and 90 per cent shall be converted into the national irrigation fund.
 A penalty of fine and imprisonment is provided as punishment for persons cutting timber on the public domain, or maliciously setting fire to timber or underbrush. Provision is made for the use by settlers of timber for farm and domestic purposes. Lands chiefly valuable for commercial stone shall be subject to entry under the placer mining laws.
 Senator Fulton of Oregon made a vigorous protest against the bill and will endeavor to have the fund for counties increased to 20 per cent.
