Local Option Void in Coos.

Salem, Apr. 10—The Supreme court passed on the following cases today: In the matter of the petition of E. D. Hussey for a writ of habeas corpus, the State of Oregon respondent, E. D. Hussey appellant appeal from the Circuit court for Coos County. J. W. Hamilton, judge; the judgment in the case at bar must be reversed and the cause remanded, with direction for the discharge of the prisoner and it so ordered.
 In the case of Marsden vs Harlocker, it is decided that the local option act in Coos county is void, hence the judgment is reversed and the cause remanded, with directions for the discharge of the prisoner.
 The local saloonmen are making preparations to again open their places of business and have posted notices of their intention to apply to the town board of trustees for a license April 20th.

Schooners Collide on San Francisco Bay.

 Two schooners crashed together in the darkness on the bay late last night and both were damaged. Neither sank but for a time it was feared that both would go to the bottom.
 The injured vessels are the San Buena Ventura and the Haleyon. The latter was swinging at anchor when the former suddenly loomed up before the eyes of the night watch and before the alarm could be given struck her squarely amidships. For a moment the two schooners hung together grinding each others sides into kindling wood; then the current tore the San Buena Ventura away and carried her on past the Haleyon. It is not thought any one aboard either vessel was lost.
 The San Buena Ventura arrived early last evening from Coquille river and anchored off Meigs wharf. Her anchor failed to get a good hold and she was caught by the tide and carried against the Haleyon. Nothing could be done to prevent the crash as the one bore down on the other.

Wholesale Land Frauds in Curry County Alleged.

 Wholesale land frauds in Curry county are occupying the attention of the federal grand jury and important indictments are expected. It is said that innumerable fraudulent entries were made on the valuable timber lands of the county and immense tracts were secured in the interest of wealthy eastern timber grabbers. The methods were similar to those which have already caused a number of indictments. Men were employed to make entries on the land falsely swearing that they were taking the claims in their own interest and behalf, while in fact they were mere dummies for the big operators to whom the lands were subsequently conveyed.
 The utmost secrecy is maintained by the federal officials as to the identity of the persons under investigation. It is probable that in this as in other cases that have occupied the attention of the present grand jury, the names of the indicted persons will not be made public until the arrests have been made. A horde of witnesses has been in attendance, and one of the special agents remarked facetiously: "Everybody in Curry county has been brought here to testify as to the frauds." The corridor on the upper floor of the postoffice building is thronged daily by witnesses.

Sensational news is expected when the names of the persons indicted last week are made known. It is certain that some of them are men of wealth and prominence in the eastern states. The warrants were sent east for service and until the defendants are arrested their names will not be made public.
