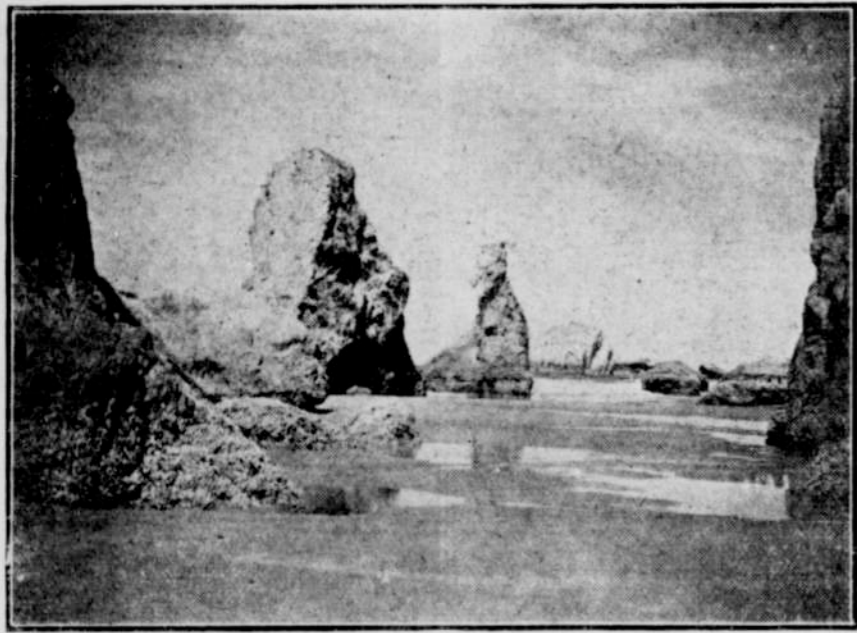

A Soldier Laid to Rest.
We have laid to rest the remains of Comrade Karl Hermann, who was born in Germany, Nov. 17, 1838, and died April 10, 1906. The deceased enlisted in the U. S. services July 10, 1863, and was assigned to the 6th California regiment of infantry and served 2 years, 3 months and 21 days, being honorably discharged at close of the war.

The funeral services were conducted at the Bandon M. E. church, by F. M. Sanderlin. The procession was led by the G. A. R., followed by a large concourse of friends. At the cemetery the G. A. R., gave the remains of our old comrade a Christian soldier's burial, as he had been raised and lived a member of the Lutheran church.
