THE BEST IS COMING.

(From the San Francisco Call.)
The conflagration of San Francisco is no longer left to speculation and excited rumor. It is accomplished. Its extent is known. The commission district, the wholesale and manufacturing districts, and the banking district, have been swept by the besom of fire. It is over. The red record is written. It is complete. It is well to have a matter complete and finished, for that is a foundation. The treasure of the banks is safe, buried in their fire proof vaults. The great and sound insurance companies look over their loss and say "WE WILL PAY." The business men, with the lines of their external trade established, say, "We continue." Out of its ashes San Francisco cries "I AM." What accident ever cut off the eternal? Rome burned while Nero played nuptial ragtime on his fiddle, and Rome 20 centuries later is the center of the world's interest. In the time of Charles II London burned down to the mud, and London two and a third centuries later is the center of the Anglo-Saxon world. Chicago one October day 30 years ago breathed fire and seemed to die, and St. Louis, the city by the river, said the city by the lake is dead. Today the city by the river is complaining that the city by the lake is sending its sewage down the Father of Waters. Fires, cyclones and convulsions come, but if man set out to make a city where none of them will be, he will build his city in the air, in the imagination. One hundred and sixty-one years ago Lisbon fell down in a half-minute. For two centuries and three score years Lisbon has stood like the hills of God. San Francisco is scorched by a cinder, but one of her banks blown up, burned as an offering of fate, reaches into the locker of its unharmed resources and gives its millions to succor the people! It is grand. Go among the people scorched in thousands, and see their spirit. Not a word of repining, com-

plaint or surrender. On all is the spirit that rises high above calamity, that withstands storm and stress, that goes into the fire without flinching and comes out radiant and glorified. The fire has wandered hither and yon. It has taken the cottage of mechanic and the mansion of the millionaire. What of it? What city on earth ever failed of glorious resurrection from misfortune? A people that will go through the experience of this week in San Francisco, without panic, without disorder, with as much respect for her as if every jail stood and every Judge ordered the crier to open court at 9 o'clock, is a sort that water cannot drown nor fire burn. What has happened was really necessary to teach us the conditions of permanence. We have to find out these things. We have found them out. The future opens in a long and charming vista. The new city will have the charms of the old and more. Really what has happened is merely the clearing of the foundation upon which is to be built the city beautiful—the San Francisco that is to be Watch us.

Exciting Chase After Smith, the Desperado.

Salem, April 28—This morning at 12:30 at Woodburn, Sheriff Shaver, of Clackamas county and O. D. Henderson, a prominent citizen of Woodburn, were shot by the desperado and Smith, who is fleeing from justice.

Sheriff Culver of this county got on track of the fugitive and followed him so closely all day Friday that at times he was only half an hour behind, but owing to some misinformation, was prevented from catching up with him. After the fatal shooting of Shaver and Capt. O. D. Henderson, another little case of shooting took place, unfortunately, but under the circumstances, justifiable. Shortly after the special train started for Salem, some of Sheriff Culver's deputies discovered a man crouched down in front of a car, and assumed that he might be Smith. Culver called three times and gave an order for the man to throw up his hands. After firing his revolver into the ground and getting no response, he authorized one deputy to shoot. This was done and the ball took effect in the man's arm, in the fleshy part of the shoulder, but the wound is not serious. The man then cried for help and threw up both hands. He proved to be a Negro tramp who had secreted himself in the car and was completely overcome by fear. He was sent to the Salem Hospital for treatment.

At Oregon City this morning, 25 men armed with rifles boarded the train to join in the hunt for Smith. Some got off at Gervais, and the balance at Woodburn.

Smith is reported as having been seen near the Chase ranch, a short distance from Champoeg. He is evidently making for the river. He has evidently been wounded, but how seriously cannot be known until he is captured.

The whole country is up in arms, and it is only a question of hours until the murderer will be accounted for.

A message from Champoeg says that Smith is now thought to be going south, or else back toward Woodburn.

Woman's Suffrage.
Woman's suffrage has proven to be a complete success in the state of Idaho. My experience in Idaho politics was considerable prior to the adoption of the amendment granting the right of suffrage to women, and I am consequently in a position to state that the right of suffrage has been of extraordinary influence in political affairs in this state.

I feel that in no state in the Union are political affairs more cleanly conducted. The women citizens of the state take practically the same interest in politics here as do their brother citizens, and the woman vote is proportionately as large as the man vote at each election. In consequence of this activity, Idaho at each election has better candidates for office, the legislature has passed better laws, and the enforcement of the laws have been more rigid than in surrounding states.

There is now in operation in Germany between 5000 and 6000 alcohol engines, and it is estimated that when alcohol designed for such purposes in the United States is free from government tax a much larger number will be used here. Internal combustion engines using alcohol as a motor fuel are coming into general use on farms for running all kinds of farm machinery. By the use of alcohol 20 per cent more power can be secured on a given engine than can be obtained by the use of gasoline, as alcohol can be compressed to a much higher degree than gasoline without danger of spontaneous combustion.—Ex.
