Berwick Has Stormy Passage.

After being buffeted about by wind and wave, driven back on her course for more than 100 miles on two different occasions and at times hidden in the trough of the seas from which no escape appeared possible the little gasoline schooner **Berwick,** Captain **Caughell,** arrived this morning from **San Francisco,** the passage occupying 17 days. When she succeeded in putting into **Marshfield** the other day her supply of water, fuel and food was practically exhausted, and the men had begun to believe that the sea would soon claim another victim.

The **Berwick** belongs to **R. D. Home,** the **Rogue River** canneryman. She had been plying in the salmon trade between **Southern Oregon** and **San Francisco.** After the destruction of the **Bay City** it was decided to send the vessel north to get supplies. Soon after she departed a strong northwest gale swept the entire coast. When off **Point Arena** the full force of the wind caught her broadside and carried her back to a point opposite **Bodega,** a distance of more than 100 miles. Temporary refuge from the storm was sought in a sort of sheltered cove, and there she lay for 24 hours.

When she again started up the coast the weather was fair, but when she got off **Crescent City** the gale began with renewed fury. Not being able to stand against it the little gasoline schooner again began to drift. On this occasion she was carried back to **Cape Mendocino,** nearly 100 miles. Another temporary retreat was found, and she lay there nearly a day. But water, food and fuel were getting scarce on board, and the officers determined to make an effort to reach some point where they could procure supplies.

The craft was once more steered out into the raging storm, but for a number of days she made very little progress. The seas ran mountain high; and at times nothing but great walls of water could be seen on either side. But the **Berwick** proved to be a good sea boat, and shipped but little water. After fiercely battling with the elements she finally succeeded in putting into **Marshfield,** where the larder was restocked. Only one day's supply of fresh water remained on board. From **Coos Bay** to **Astoria** the schooner made a fine passage.

After taking on a cargo of supplies and a refrigerating plant the **Berwick** will sail on the return trip to **Rogue River.** The captain says he expects to get away about Tuesday.—Telegram.
