Entire Republican State Ticket Elected Except Governor.

Chamberlain May Win Out.

Salem, June 5—Incomplete returns from the state election Monday show that the Republican ticket was elected, the Democratic State Committee claiming Governor Chamberlain's election by a small plurality. The legislature is Republican.

Sheriff Word, of Portland, is probably elected. Senator Brownell, of Clackamas county is defeated. Jonathan Bourne is elected United States Senator by five thousand majority.

Election returns are very incomplete, owing to the great length of the ballot, and will not be fully reported for several days.

The remote country precincts are showing up uniform Republican gains over four years ago but the factional fights in the city precincts show scratched tickets, to the detriment of the Republicans.

Jonathan Bourne, for United States Senator, will have a large plurality over Gearin and will probably lead the ticket over both Republican candidates for congress. Returns show that Ellis and Hawley are elected to congress, the latter not having the full Republican vote.

The Democratic campaign managers put up a surprising fight for their entire ticket and have more credit in some respects than the Republicans, so far as accomplishing results is concerned.

An operation was performed on Ernest Book yesterday for appendicitis by Drs. Horsfall and Houston and small hope is entertained for his recovery. He was around town Saturday but complained of a pain in his side. Sunday a doctor was called and he was found to be in a serious condition. An operation was decided upon and Dr. Horsfall arrived yesterday from Marshfield and the operation was performed in the afternoon. The patient's condition was critical and the doctors said his chance for surviving, even with the operation, was almost hopeless. At noon today he was resting easy but the change for better or worse may not come for two or three days.

GOVERNMENT TO PUSH COQUILLE IMPROVEMENTS.

District Attorney Bristol had a conference Friday with J. W. Polhemus, of the U. S. Engineers' office, relative to improvements at the mouth of Coquille river, says the Telegram. Mr. Bristol recently secured instructions from Washington to co-operate with the engineers, and went over the situation with Mr. Polhemus. It is the plan of the Government to push the improvements, says Mr. Bristol. He has examined maps, plats and looked into the question of a right-of-way for a new tram road to gain access to a fresh supply of jetty rock. Mr. Bristol will look after the legal side of a new right of way and title to land on which to build a new dock.
