## STEWART WRITES ABOUT CURRY COUNTY INDICTMENTS.

The Oregonian of the 20th, contains a list of names of persons indicted by Federal Grand Jury of Portland, for alleged timber frauds said to have been perpetrated in Curry County by persons connected in various ways with the Pacific Lumber and Furniture Company of Los Angeles. Among the names are many known to the people of this county, including the following: R. D. Jones, W. H. Smith, J. C. Cross, D. M. Goodwin, W. D. Gould, Frank A. Stewart, W. T. Kerr, John R. Miller, F. W. Dennis, L. G. Stearus, J. Huntley, A. S. Johnson, some "John Does" and several others. They are to be arrested soon, bonds being fixed at from 1 to 5 thousand dollars, and it is supposed they will be tried during the summer. As has been the usual practice in such cases in Oregon, the information in regard to these indictments has been given to the Press in sensational arguments prejudicial to the rights of the defendants, and in violation of equitable proceedings, and a "square deal." The stigma of indictment should rest against no man's name when he is easily reached, and has hitherto borne an honorable name, without giving him a show to be heard before the grand jury that indicts him.

Some of the men indicted are just as fine men as can be found in Oregon or California—incapable of dishonorable deeds of any kind, their only crime being that they got innocently interested in a concern managed by shrewd, experienced, unprincipled adventurers, whom they did not know as such at the beginning. Indictments against such men must fail if justice is done, but they should have been heard before the hand of Law puts its burden of disgrace and annoyance upon them. It will be found upon full examination, unless perjury prevails, that the statement of the frauds has been fearfully exaggerated, and that it is doubtful if a single timber claim was obtained through fraudulent filings, or collusion before filing.

I am charged with having "procured money for fraudulent filings" which is utterly false, as I never had one cent of the company's money for such purposes, or for any purpose. I was never a qualified member of the Company, never saw or signed its articles of Incorporation, never had a dollar of its stock; although a share was sent me, I promptly sent it back, and declined to accept positions offered me. This occurred in September 1902, at which time the company had not procured or bargained for a timber claim to my knowledge, nor have I since had any connection with the company. All my transactions previous to that, were lawful, and such as any one had a right to do. There was not a single case of collusion known by me or promoted by me. The rush of filings on claims, by our settlers, in which so many of neighbors were likewise interested was caused by an inundation of people, utter strangers to our county, from Idaho, Wisconsin and other distant places.

What I did then, I would do again under similar conditions. The government has not been defrauded by anything I did, but the delay to our people whose claims have been held up, when they were honestly filed on and paid for, has been an unwarranted hardship.
