Election News.

Portland, June 5—Governor Chamberlain has carried the state by a decisive majority. In a list of counties including Multnomah, in a count of 11,000, he has a lead of 468. At the same ratio for the rest of the state, this means a majority of 800. In Clatsop he has 200 majority, Malheur and Baker 600, Linn 400, Yamhill 250, Grant 150, Marion 100 to 500, Union 606, Wasco 250, Umatilla 100, Josephine 100, Douglas 200.

Later returns show Word in the lead for sheriff, and the indication points to his election. All Republican candidates in the county except Stevens, for sheriff, are elected by a big majority. The Republican legislative ticket won by a vote of three to one.

Chamberlain is re-elected by a vote of from 2000 to 5000, says Chairman Sweek, of the Democratic Committee. The vote is far heavier than expected, exceeding the estimates. Many counties conceded to Withycombe have been carried by Chamberlain. Gearin ran far ahead of his ticket, but the popular indorsement has gone to Jonathan Bourne. The Republicans have elected both congressional candidates, Ellis by a large majority in the Second district, and Hawley by a greatly reduced party vote in the First. The entire Republican state ticket with the exception of Withycombe has been elected by large majorities. In some precincts, Benson, for secretary of state, got two votes to Withycombe's one.

Later returns show an increased majority for Chamberlain. Word for sheriff is probably elected. The equal suffrage amendment and the local option amendment are defeated. Senator Gearin, Democrat, is running far ahead of his ticket, as is Galloway, Democrat, in the First congressional district, but both are defeated.

Returns, so far as available last night, assured the election of John F. Hall as county judge. On sheriff the vote was too close for the comfort of either party. Upton was conceding his defeat for representative. As between Anderson and Sighn for county commissioner, it was close, but few figures were available. The county has gone wet by a safe majority.

From the outside news it would seem that Chamberlain is probably elected, the only Democrat to pull through. Woman suffrage is defeated as well as the amendment to the local option law. A telegram to J. W. Flanagan from the Portland Journal said: "Chamberlain elected by 2,000, Gearin defeated, Galloway defeated; both ran far ahead tickets; liquor amendment, equal suffrage both defeated."

W. J. Butler had a message from the Oregonian, saying that governor was close with chances favoring Chamberlain, woman suffrage was defeated, other Republicans elected.—Coast Mail.

San Francisco, June 4—A strike of cooks, firemen and sailors this morning tied up the steam schooners Santa Monica, San Pedro and James F. Higgins, new arrivals in port. The Steam Schooner Owners Association and representatives of the Sailors' Union are now in session for the purpose of bringing the strike to a quiet termination.

The sch. Oregon struck while going out of the river last week and got into San Francisco with six feet of water in her hold and cabins and forecastle flooded. All hands had to get what sleep they could on top of the lumber, and the cook had to prepare his meals there. Capt. Johnson, of the tug Triumph, put in some time sounding where the Oregon struck to find out if there was a rock, but reports there was plenty of water and a soft sand bottom. He thinks a drifting sunken snag caused the trouble.
