The steamer Liberty has been on the mud flat this week undergoing repairs.

The steamer Liberty which has been on the mud flat for repairs, broke her moorings at high tide Monday and drifted across the river. The life saving crew put a line on her and the tug Triumph pulled her back to the dock.

Beginning with July 1, the steamer Alliance will carry United States mail between Portland, Coos Bay points and Eureka. The California & Oregon Steamship Company, owner of the Alliance, entered into a contract with the government yesterday to handle the mail on the route designated. By the terms of the agreement she is supposed to complete the round trip in at least nine days. This is about the schedule on which she has been operated during the past year. The mail subsidy holds good until July 1, 1907.

At present the Mail from Eureka is sent to San Francisco and then forwarded to Portland over the Southern Pacific. From Coos Bay it is usually sent by stage to the nearest railroad station. The Government reserves the right to forward all mail overland when when the Alliance is not at Eureka or Coos Bay if it is known to be possible to get it through to its destination more quickly than by using the steamer.

When the Alliance begins handling United States mail it is declared that the sailors will be powerless to tie her up by going on strike.—Telegram.

The report on the packing houses and stock industry made by Government Inspectors Charles P. Neill and James K. Reynolds to President Roosevelt contains startling and sensational exposures of the unsanitary conditions prevailing in Chicago plants operated by the trust and goes into details concerning the habitual sale of unclean and contaminated meats. The report consists of notes and affidavits of employes and patrons. Many of the most shocking statements are backed by affidavits.

The report states that "lard is made from hogs that have died of cholera." And that the oil from hogs dying in transit is used for "sardine oil" and sold as such throughout the world.

The unsanitary conditions at the packing houses are described as frightful and revolting. Refuse is sold as meat in both America and Europe. Meat rejected in Europe is treated with chemicals and sold in America.

Lump jaw cattle are butchered without inspection while hogs afflicted with trichinosis are butchered and sold in the country.

So called "potted chicken" is not chicken at all, but is composed of the flesh of "bob veal."

"Leaf lard," advertised and exploited for its purity, contains 20 per cent of cottonseed oil.

One concern has a chemist to perfect a process for deodorizing decayed hams; meat in all the packing plants is doctored with borax and other dangerous chemicals, after having been spoiled; dangerous chemicals are also used for "smoked meats."

Many of the employes suffer from tuberculosis and are unclean in their work and habits. They expectorate on the meat, walk over it and drag it over the filthy floors.

The report recommends that the buildings be remodeled in order to obtain better ventilation and more light; that ample facilities should be provided for employes far enough removed from the rooms in which meat is prepared to prevent contamination, and that there should be lavatories to insure personal cleanliness.
