If enough patronage can be secured the creamery will be built at once, and the company behind this project is one of the largest in the state.

Mr. Marshall, the gentleman interested in the paper and pulp mill project for this place, left Jersey City last Saturday for this place and is expected the latter part of this week or the first of next. He will remain here about a week and wants to meet as many people as possible who are interested in this enterprise. It is sincerely to be hoped that satisfactory arrangements can be made for the establishment of such a plant. On the surface it appears that conditions here are ideal for the pulp and paper business and that it would pay good returns on the investment. Mr. Marshall, we are told, understands the business perfectly, and after he arrives here and looks over the situation will be able to talk intelligently with our people. Some have already subscribed for stock and many others are only waiting Mr. Marshall's arrival to get his opinion, and if the situation is anywhere near his expectations, a considerable amount of stock will be taken at once. A pulp and paper mill here would be one of the biggest enterprises in the county and it would benefit directly or indirectly everybody in the vicinity.

Port Orford.

We would like to see Mr. Allen get the claims, and wish him well; but we also wish our old neighbors well, first.

Deputy U. S. Marshal Griffith of Portland came down last week as far as Langlois, where he was met by J. Huntley, John R. Miller, A. S. Johnson and Frank A. Stewart, the indicted "Land Grabbers," who all went before U. S. Commissioner Upton, and promptly gave bonds for their appearance in the U. S. District court, at some future time. Mr. Griffith said that they were the most accommodating men he had ever known, as usually the Marshal has to hunt up his men, but in this instance the men hunted him up. Mr. Griffith is a very pleasant gentleman and won the good opinion of all who met him by his genial ways and total lack of arrogance so often met with in officials of momentary power.

The Safety Razor.—The other day Elbert Dyer was showing the boys in the store one of the safety razors now in the market. It is a nickle plated contrivance, and is pronounced a fairly good "shaver." Bill Nye has been projecting with one of them and he thus puts it: "The safety razor resembles in appearance several other toilet articles, such as the spoke shave, the road-scraper, the can-opener, the lawn-mower and the turban water-wheel, but it does not look like a razor. It also looks like a carpet-sweeper some and reminds me of a monkey-wrench."
