DIED—Stephen A. Alumbaugh, at his home at New Lake, Or. June 13, 1906, aged 67 years, 9 months and 23 days.

The deceased had been a sufferer from apoplexy for a long time, having been an invalid for about eighteen months.

He was born in Sullivan county, Indiana, Aug. 20, 1838. Enlisted in the 2nd Iowa Battery at Adel, Iowa, Oct. 24, 1861, and was discharged from the army at Keokuk, Iowa, Feb. 17, 1863. On Nov. 1, 1863 he was married to Mary E. Magart, near Adel, Iowa. He has been a resident of Oregon since 1877, the last 5 1/2 years being spent at Bandon.

He leaves one son, James Alumbaugh, of New Lake, and one daughter, Mrs. Rosa Bingaman, of Bandon, one brother and one sister at Napa City, Cal., and a host of friends to mourn his loss.

His wife preceded him to the next world just three months and eleven days, having passed away at her home in Bandon, March 2, 1906.

At the request of the deceased no church service was held over his remains, the funeral services being conducted at the cemetery by the G. A. R. of Bandon, of which he was a member. (Polk county papers please copy.)

The rains of the present month, besides being unusual for the season, were very heavy, swelling various streams down the coast to as high a point as was reached at any time during the winter.

At its annual meeting the Coquille Fishermen's Union decided to limit the number of fishing boats on the river to fifty-two; last year there were nearly eighty. Prices of salmon were fixed at 40 and 60 cents.

Judge Harlocker called an extra session of the county court on Friday for the purpose of declaring the result of the election in regard to the local option law. They declare Coquille and Myrtle Point dry under the law. They also approved the plan of the new town of Port Lown Addition to North Bend.—Herald.

Shoemaker will have charge of Mr. Zeek's bay and feed business. The stock has been moved from the cannery building into the Rosa building.
