HELP REBUILD SAN FRANCISCO SCHOOLS.

To School Officers and Teachers of the Public Schools of Oregon—Ladies and Gentlemen.

As a result of the great catastrophe which befell San Francisco on the 18th of April, thirty-four school buildings were destroyed, to replace which will cost about \$6,000,000 and a consequent lack of employment for the teachers who taught therein, the school authorities of San Francisco are led to accept proffered donations to be devoted exclusively to a Reconstruction Fund for the rebuilding of their schools. They do not desire to seem to beg, but the finances of the City of San Francisco will be strained to the utmost and it would be a considerable time before they, unaided, could hope to replace their schools. It is their purpose, whenever the contributions from a given state shall reach a sufficient amount to construct a building, to name that building after the state giving the money. In any event, tablets showing the source from which the building fund came will be placed upon the buildings and it will doubtless be a matter of pride for the rising generation in their visits to the new and more glorious San Francisco to visit the building which stands as a monument to their generosity and sympathy.

In view of these facts, I would respectfully suggest that your respective schools devise ways and means by which contributions, either great or small, may be made to this worthy cause. COAST MAIL AND ADVERTISER TO CONSOLIDATE.

Wednesday's Journal had the following:

J. B. McClellan, of Ohio, who was a visitor at Coos Bay during the recent farmers' congress, was in Portland yesterday, en route to the east. He said:

"I believe Coos bay has a great future, and in proof of it I will place my son there in business. We have purchased the business of the Coast Mail, the daily paper at Marshfield, and consolidated with the Advertiser. We will make a first-class little daily paper for the community. Mr. Levar, formerly editor of the Mail, retains his typesetting machine, press and printing plant, and will do commercial printing. We will put in a linotype, and otherwise improve the plant of the consolidated daily."

CLEARING RIGHT OF-WAY.

W. R. Haines, of the Haines music company, of Marshfield, was in the city the first of the week. He had just returned from a trip up the Umpqua and to Drain. He found much evidence all along the line of the intention of the Southern Pacific to begin active construction work.

The right of way was being cleared and the cross section surveys were being made. The engineers were also setting the grade stakes for the bridges.

There will be fourteen bridges between Drain and Scottsburg, mainly over small creeks. But the two across Elk creek and the one across Paradise creek will be of large size.

Engineer Brown now has his camp in the Simpson Lumber company's building at old North Bend. Mr. Brown has about completed the survey of the road. He has given the management two routes to choose from between Ten Mile and the bay. One is by way of Shetter's landing and involves a tunnel. The other is around through the sand hills.

Mr. Brown will now be occupied in surveying three routes on the peninsula. One will be along the east shore and near the water front. The other will be up Pony Inlet. Both of these surveys will connect with the Spreckel's road.

A survey will also be made up South inlet and across the divide to the Coquille. It is found that this route will save a distance of eight miles on the Coast road.

The Telegram of Wednesday makes a note that bids had been asked for on the Drain route and had probably been submitted.

Engineer Brown when seen last night by a representative of the Harbor stated that he had no instructions further than to survey the Drain road to Coos Bay. He did not know what work would be done on the peninsula—Harbor.

Wm. Miller of Baker City, Or., arrived last week and is visiting Bandon relatives.

S. S. Little informs us that he picked 88 quarts of strawberries in his patch one day last week. Despite the unseasonable weather his berries are ripening nicely and he finds a ready sale at 12 1/2 cents a box.
