Chairman Burton Says 40-Foot Channel Talk is Absurd.

Resolution Will Not be Reported.

Washington, June 28—Senator Fulton and other Pacific Coast senators have been flooded recently with letters demanding the passage through the House of the Fulton resolution authorizing a survey at the entrance to Coos Bay, with a view to providing a 40 foot channel across the bar.

Senator Fulton again took up the matter with Chairman Burton, of the Rivers and Harbors Committee today, but was told as on previous occasions, that the resolution would not now or hereafter be reported.

Burton says it is absurd to talk about a 40 foot channel at Coos Bay. New York harbor does not have that depth, and Hamburg, Germany, one of the world's greatest harbors only has 32 feet.

Burton says that Coos Bay has no population or commerce to justify a 40 foot channel, and for that reason he will never consent to such survey. When the river and harbor bill is framed at the next session, a survey for some reasonable channel may be authorized.
