Additional evidence that the South ern Pacific Company intends to build a railroad along the coast from Eure ka, Calif., to Marshfield, connecting at the latter point with the forthcom ing branch from Drain, thus com pleting another through road from Portland to San Francisco, was fur nished this morning, when a South ern Pacific surveying party of 30 men, who arrived last night from San Francisco, left this morning for Marshfield, to commence the survey of the remaining links of the projected line. The party is comprised of sever regular surveyors, their assistants mostly students from the University of California, and camp tender Four of Kelly & Banks' three-sested hacks, each drawn by four horses were utilized in transporting the party to Myrtle Point, from where they
