COQUILLE NEWS NOTES

Leander, Our Correspondent Tells of the Week's Incidents at the Hub.

Surveying Coast Line.

Thirty Engineers Arrive in Coos County to Continue the Work.

Additional evidence that the Southern Pacific Company intends to build a railroad along the coast from Eureka, Calif., to Marshfield, connecting at the latter point with the forthcoming branch from Drain, thus completing another through road from Portland to San Francisco, was furnished this morning, when a Southern Pacific surveying party of 30 men, who arrived last night from San Francisco, left this morning for Marshfield, to commence the survey of the remaining links of the projected line. The party is comprised of seven regular surveyors, their assistants, mostly students from the University of California, and camp tenders. Four of Kelly & Banks' three-seated hacks, each drawn by four horses, were utilized in transporting the party to Myrtle Point, from where they will journey by rail to Marshfield.

Upon reaching Marshfield, the party will divide, one portion proceeding to Port Orford, to survey down to Crescent City, Calif., a distance of 75 miles, the other members going to Beaver Hill, near Marshfield, a branch of the Coos Bay & Eastern R. R., recently bought by the S. P. Co., so it is reported, and commencing a survey from that point south to Port Orford, a distance of 60 miles. Another Southern Pacific party of surveyors is already in the field between Crescent City and Eureka, a distance of 102 miles. It is estimated that the entire survey will be completed in three months. Just how soon after the survey the construction of the line will begin, is a matter of conjecture.

Reduction in the expense of motive power and in running time is the object of the projected new coast line. At no place will the road, as planned, exceed a grade of one per cent. By comparing such a road with the present one from Portland to San Francisco with its many steep grades, particularly in the Siskiyou district, one can readily see that the new line will pay its cost of construction in a few years by the great saving to its owners in the cost of hauling freight trains and in the time consumed in their travel.—Roseburg Review.
