The Common Council of the City of Coquille, realizing the seriousness of the city's predicament from a financial point of view, and the growing sentiment for the banishment of local prohibition, has decided to ask another expression of the municipality on the subject of alcohol. To this end the council has a special session Wednesday evening, Mayor Stanley in the chair, and on a legal opinion that the city could proceed under an amendment adopted at the late State election, it was unanimously voted to call a special election. This will be held at Masonic Hall on Monday, July 9th, 1906.

The voters will decide whether the charter shall be amended to permit the existence of saloons, and an annual license of not less than \$600 each. Other licensing matters, and the prohibition of gambling, bawdy houses, houses of ill fame, etc., will also be voted on. Notices of election have been printed and posted.—Sentinel.

### Work Begins About July 15 At Drain.

J. W. Nier, right of way agent, is authority for the statement that grading will begin on the Drain road before the 15th of July.

Mr. Nier was seen at Elkton by the writer. He said that he would be on Coos Bay inside of ten days to look after right of way matters. He expects to remain only three or four days this trip but will come again.

Mr. Nier also set at rest another important question. He said it was not the intention of the company to go on the east side of the bay in order to reach Marshfield but to construct a line as direct as possible. He stated that the bay would be crossed at North Bend. He hoped this plan would be satisfactory to all the people on the bay.

It certainly will. All Marshfield desires is railway connection, the same as the rest of us, and it will want the shortest and straightest line.

A road on the peninsula, either along the shore or up Pony inlet, will serve Marshfield better than a road to circle around the bay on the east side.

But anyway the location of the road should be left to the railway company itself. The Southern Pacific in building this line is looking to the needs and convenience of the people as well as its own investment. Any route that meets the judgement of the railroad will receive the hearty approval of the people.

In order to bridge the bay plans must first be approved by the secretary of war and then there must be an act of congress granting the right.

The writer also saw General Manager O'Brien in his office in Portland. He also confirmed the report that the work of grading would soon begin and said every necessary step to that end was being taken.

Mr. O'Brien said that he was planning to pay Coos Bay a visit within the next thirty days.—Harbor.
