## COQUILLE NEWS NOTES

Devoted to her family and circle of friends she exemplified pure and noble womanhood, sacrificing for the comfort of others. Words are but idle expressions of sympathy to the poor orphaned children who need a mother's care, but the hands on the dial glass of time denotes her day of usefulness is past. Her cheery good mornings will greet us no more. Life is but a slender fibre. She has left dear ones that are tottering on the threshold of earthly dissolution. Soon the boatman will carry them across the dark and mystical river to join their loved ones dwelling with the realms of the blest.

### Myrtle Point.

The open season for killing buck deer begins August 15th and for female deer the season opens the first of September.

L. M. Ormsby left on Thursday's stage for Salem to bring his wife to the Sixes where they will make their home. Mr. Ormsby has a contract for constructing a 200-foot tunnel at Rusty Butte for the Estbergs, 102 feet of which is now completed and showing satisfactory results.

Otto Epps of Eckley is still after that belt for big game hunting. He states under date of the 4th that he has killed two panthers and two bears during the week preceding. This brings Mr. Epps' total up to 23 panthers and 18 bears during the past year.

Sheriff-elect W. W. Gage was inducted into his office Tuesday of this week succeeding Steve Gallier. The sheriff's first trip was to Myrtle Point, coming up on Wednesday, and from here he went to Bandon. The new sheriff has appointed his son Clyde as deputy and has named Matt Goodman as court house janitor. Judge Hall took his office the first of the month and the county is now working under the new officials chosen at the recent election.

McCloskey & Mehl, the hardware men, have commenced the erection of a two-story business block, east of the Coquille Valley Packing company building and it will be hurried to completion as rapidly as possible. The lower story will contain two store rooms, one 30 by 90 feet and the other 20 by 90, both of which will be occupied by the firm.

O. S. Coleman, who lives four miles out of town on the East Fork, brought in to the Enterprise office Wednesday, a bunch of fish poles which he alleges are oat straws, and the heads would appear to carry out his contention. The largest of the straws is 8 feet and 7 inches high, with a head of 24 inches of well filled oats. The straw is nearly half an inch in diameter. There were five straws in the bunch, the other four being nearly as long as the largest, and they all sprung from one grain of oats. The field is on bench land and the grain stands so thick that it would hold a hat almost anywhere, and the straws would easily conceal a six-foot man almost any place in the field. Mr. Coleman intends to cut the grain for hay.—Enterprise.

A boat loaded to the water's edge with two ladies and ten men was capsized at about midnight Wednesday on the river fronting Riverton. The party had been to a show and was returning to the banks opposite the town when the accident happened. Luckily Charley Ashton was handy in his launch, and the overturned occupants were rescued with nothing worse than a chilling bath and the spoiling of at least two bonnets.—Sentinel.

### Port Orford.

Port Orford "Jakey" returned from Bandon Tuesday, where he had been to attend a war dance of "native Americans," which was held at that place on July 4th.

In the death of Robert Smith, at Gold Beach on Monday the 25th of June, another of Curry County's oldest pioneers crosses the Great Divide and takes one more from the ranks of the few remaining settlers who carved Curry out of the wilderness.

Provisions are scarce at Port Orford than they have been since the San Francisco quake. The steamer Plant having called in but once since the disaster, and as a consequence such staple articles as sugar and flour are fast becoming a luxury, while the faithful horse looks in vain for his potato of rolled barley.

There were good sized audiences at the church last Sunday to listen to the services conducted by Rev. Geo. Roach. Mr. Roach was accompanied on this trip by his wife and baby, and spent several days, gathering pebbles on the sea shore and seeing the many sights of interest which nature and historic events have so bountifully bestowed upon our little town, and which will some day make it one of the most popular seaside resorts on the Pacific coast.

A corp of fifteen surveyors now have their headquarters established at Port Orford and are going over the survey made by Cooper two years ago, as all papers connected with the previous survey were lost in the San Francisco disaster. There are also two other parties in the field for the same company—one North and one South of here, and this connected with the fact that the O. C. & E. R. R. have a crew of surveyors in Tillamook county and announce that they are going to rapidly push their coast road to completion is evidence that this section will not long remain cut off from the outside world.—Tribune.

### County Court Adjourns.

The County Court adjourned Wednesday until the first Monday in August after a strenuous session, as the change in officers after election caused a busy time. The new officers were all qualified, their bonds being considered sufficient without any exception. Seven road petitions were favorably reported upon and all were referred to the Prosecuting Attorney, as the law directs, and if found properly managed the Court will order said roads opened at the adjourned term. Aside from qualifying officers, the usual routine of business was had. A few bills were cut down but in the main all bills were passed and ordered paid. It looks natural to see Sheriff Gage in the sheriff's office, and Clerk Watson, Treasurer Dolley and Assessor Thrift grace their departments in their usual courteous manner.—Sentinel.
