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Tug Geo. R. Vosburg Coming to Bandon.

Just as soon as she has been inspected the tug Geo. R. Voshurg will leave for Bandon, Coquille river, where she will be employed during the next three months towing ships in and out over the bar. She will take the place of the tug Triumph, which will go to Astoria to undergo extensive repairs.

For the past half year the Vosburg bas been lying idle in the tocal harbor When she came over to this side of the river this morning and tied up at the Oak-street dock it was found that she leaked slightly. It is probable that some work will have to be done to her before the craft leaves for Bandon. She is receiving supplies today, and if the inspectors find ber to be in passable condition it is quite likely that she will get away tomorrow afternoon or Saturday.
