Successful Meeting of Veterans at Myrtle Point.

The G. A. R. reunion held Wednesday and Thursday of last week was well attended and successful in every way and the visitors left with a feeling that they had been well repaid for their attendance.

The local committee, composed of W. H. H. Renfro, R. W. Lundy and D. A. Huling received much praise for the success of the meeting and Mr. Renfro commander and C. A. Marcy as adjutant saw to it the program was snappy and interesting from start to finish.

Another Boat for the Coquille.

Steam Schooner and Barge Will Carry Million Feet of Lumber.

An important bit of news to the people of the Coquille river is the purchase of the steam schooner "Coquille River" by the Riverton Lumber Co. and the announcement that the vessel will go on a regular run between this port and San Francisco.

The Coquille river arrived in port yesterday morning, Capt. Martin, late of the Chico, in command, and will be loaded at the Aberdeen mill.

Commencing with her next trip it is the intention to tow the barge Chinook to and from the city. The barge will carry from six to seven hundred thousand feet of lumber and this, added to the Coquille River's capacity will make a grand total of about one million feet each trip and should pay handsome dividends to the owners. The steamer will load at the Aberdeen mill and the barge at the Riverton mill.

The steam schooner Coquille River was built at Prosper in 1896 and was originally intended to run to this river. Her draught, however, proved too great for the bar at that time and in less than a year she was pulled off the run and sent elsewhere where larger cargoes could be taken. She is 146 ft. in length, 34.2 ft breadth and 12.4 depth. Gross tonnage 424-10.

A dispatch from Moscow, Idaho, dated Aug 31st, says: Judge Lukes today decided to hold W. J. Shrieves and Roy Taylor to the next grand jury for the murder of David Collier and fixed their bonds at \$600 each. The preliminary examination of the accused occupied all of the last week, and at the conclusion of the arguments of counsel Saturday evening the court took the case under advisement. The bonds fixed are the lowest ever known in Idaho where the crime charged manslaughter.

Just as soon as she has been inspected the tug Geo. R. Vosburg will leave for Bandon, Coquille river, where she will be employed during the next three months towing ships in and out over the bar. She will take the place of the tug Triumph, which will go to Astoria to undergo extensive repairs.

For the past half year the Vosburg has been lying idle in the local harbor. When she came over to this side of the river this morning and tied up at the Oak-street dock it was found that she leaked slightly. It is probable that some work will have to be done to her before the craft leaves for Bandon. She is receiving supplies today, and if the inspectors find her to be in passable condition it is quite likely that she will get away tomorrow afternoon or Saturday. The Vosburg is in command of Captain Dodge.—Portland Telegram.
