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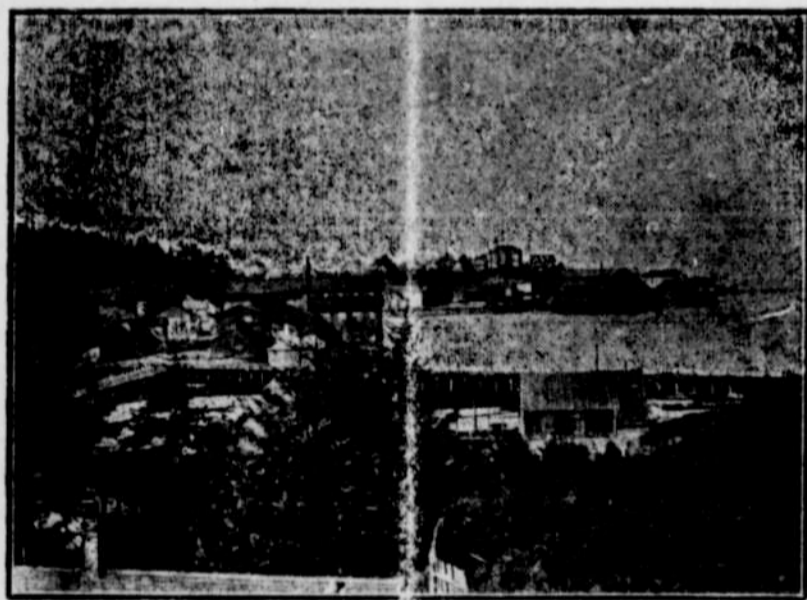

Daring Rescue.

Little Joe Noble, the 4-year-old grandson of W. H. Noble, had a hair-breadth escape yesterday from a watery grave. That he is alive today is due to the heroic bravery of Mayor L. J. Simpson, who, at the peril of his life, jumped into the water and rescued the tot just as he was sinking from the surface for the second time, dragging him to the shore and resuscitating him before the remainder of the party realized what had happened and could return to the scene.
