MOVE TO BUILD LOCALLY OWNED STEAMER.

The subject is again being agitated of building a steamer with local capital to ply between Bandon and Portland. This time the project finds its birth among the merchants and business men of the county seat who have a well developed grievance against the Marshfield Myrtle Point railway line.

Ever since this road became the property of that grasping corporation, the Southern Pacific Company, the 23 of last July, it has elevated its tolls on freights to the extent that the merchant has been squeezed beyond all endurance. The road never had a reputation for benevolence or accommodation under its former ownership, but now it is ten-fold worse with the Espee at the helm. The policy is certainly a very foolish one for the company which should have reckoned on the opportunities presented by Coquille river to the suffering shipper via Marshfield, and from present indications these opportunities are to be speedily embraced. There can be but one correct. The road will only divert its freight traffic to Coquille bar, and inflict corresponding injury upon the commerce of Coos bay—seemingly indifferent and unmindful Coos bay at that.

The business and monied men of Coquille have started the ball to rolling, and they will invite their brothers of Bandon, intermediate points and Myrtle Point to join them in a joint stock company for the purpose of building a light-draught steamer for the Portland run. The proposition was mentioned to the editor at Coquille Saturday, and our informant expressed the belief that the wholesalers of Portland could be induced to take some stock in the venture, both as an investment and as a means of building up trade with the Coquille country.

A vessel that would answer all requirements could be built, it is estimated, for about \$50,000, and this sum ought to be raised without difficulty in the Coquille valley, or both here and in Portland. It may be that a suitable boat could be purchased outright, in which event the delay of construction would be avoided, but that is hardly to be expected in view of the scarcity of small steam craft these days.

That the project would prove profitable financially, and that Bandon and the adjacent country would take a hand in it seems certain to our mind. The move is not a new one, however, and, if we are correctly informed, our friends at the hub declined to entertain it at the time that Bandon launched it forth and invited up-river co-operation. They would not embrace it then, but the exactions of the Espee spurs them to a willingness now.

Still, for the benefit of all concerned, and for emancipation from Southern Pacific oppression, it is to be hoped that the project now reopened becomes fruitful of results. We can see nothing in it that is antagonistic

of any interests here, or that would else than benefit the best interests of lower Coquille River.
