This power, harnessed, would not only furnish Myrtle Point with lights and water, but energy for running factories of any and all kinds.

It is desired that a portion of this energy be now employed, and the local fathers are taking the initiative toward ascertaining the practicability of the plan.

Forestry Scientist Here.

Mr. Augustine Henry, a forestry scientist from London, Eng., called at the Sentinel office last week. The gentleman is visiting Coos county for the purpose of viewing our forests and studying their growth, ages of trees and nature of the soil that produces such magnificent timber.

Mr. Henry has letters of introduction from the forestry department at Washington. The main object of his visit at this time is to see our great white cedar trees growing in their native fields. He states that white cedar is used as an ornamental tree in the parks of his country, but it is called Lawson Cypress because a Mr. Lawson introduced the seed of that tree into the British Isles. Mr. Henry will visit many logging camps and some of the sawmills of Coos county. —Sentinel.

Bandon is Lively.

Mr. Alva Doll returned yesterday from Bandon, where he had been in the interests of his firm, says the Coos Bay Times. Mr. Doll stated that things are lively in Bandon, and the prices of realty are on the rise. The Kauffman Company, associated with Edgar L. Wheeler, have taken over a tract of land in the heart of Bandon which they have platted and will put on the market. The property has been given the name of Azalea Park, and consists of 220 of the finest lots in that town.

Mr. and Mrs. Wheeler are camping on the beach near Bandon, and are having an excellent outing. Mr. Doll says the fishermen at Bandon are making big catches every day of chinook and silversides, the former bringing them from 35 to 60 cents each and the latter 15 cents. He is greatly impressed with the future prospects of the town by the sea.

Cow Rides Mill Flume.

Over in Tehama county, California, a short time ago a gentle old milk cow tumbled into a mill flume and rode twenty miles before she was finally rescued from her peculiar predicament, says the Red Bluff Cause. Bessy had essayed to drink from the flume at a point where it passed under the surface of the ground, and the dirt caving beneath her fore legs, she took an involuntary header and started off at a break-neck pace. A bunch of lumber happened opportunely along on its way to the railway from the mill, a distance of 20 miles, and over this Bessy got her fore feet to quietly survey the surroundings while she traveled.

At two points along the line the flume has a strong pitch downward, it and crosses several gulches at a considerable altitude, but the cow rode them all, and at the end of 20 miles was fished from the millrace unharmed and contentedly chewing at her end. The only being seriously disturbed by the mishap was Bessy's owner, who growled because he was forced to drive the animal 20 miles to get her home, and could not use the flume in both directions.

Like Names Cause Confusion

The Oregon Journal describes a mix-up between Fairview postoffice, this county, and Fairview station on the O. R. & N. road in the northern part of the State. The postoffice name of the northern Fairview is Cleone, but the wholesalers and manufacturers at Portland frequently address to Fairview their customers of Cleone. As a consequence the Fairview postoffice on the North Fork has stacks of uncalled for letters on hand.

The postmistress there reported to the inspector recently that she had 64 such letters on hand, and was certain that at least 33 of them were intended for Cleone, but will have to remain where they are until the time limit expires when they will be returned to the writers.

Port Orford.

Mr. Byers, who has surveyed considerable government land in the vicinity of Port Orford within the last few years, arrived in town by Saturday's stage to re-run some lines as the work has not been accepted as yet by the government, but the surveyor is of the opinion that it will now pass inspection and will soon be thrown open for settlement.

James Curry's house on Elk river burned down from a defective flue, while he and his nephew were at home but were unable to subdue the fire. He saved about half his household goods. The loss is a severe one, but with youth and grit to overcome it, it is not irreparable.

Nat Dean has taken up a homestead on Sixes river, near Gene Peirce's place, and several days ago moved his family out to reside.

Harry Allen, who has had charge of the postoffice during Mr. Johnston's absence, is going to Bandon with his family, where he will spend a few weeks visiting relatives and looking over the situation and if favorably impressed will locate permanently.

Miss Agnes Sullivan and sister, Miss Isabel, came up on the steamer, and have gone out to their relatives on Sixes river.

Three Japs who have been working in the Wedderburn hotel during the summer passed through town the latter part of last week on their way out of the country. It seems as if some suspicion was entertained as to the contents of their baggage, but a search warrant failed to reveal any appropriated articles.—Tribune.

The sad intelligence of the death of Mrs. Eliza Yoakam, which occurred received at the home of her son, I. A. Yoakam, near Susanville, Cal., was received at Coquille by wire the day following. The deceased was 85 years old and a pioneer lady of this county.

A Successful Creamery.

The Gravel Ford creamery closed down a few days ago after a very satisfactory season's run, says the Enterprise. Hitherto there has been expressed much dissatisfaction and disappointment among the dairymen, but this year general satisfaction has been heard, and there is a determination to enter the coming season with renewed zeal.

During the past season the plant, owned by Fred B. Haight & Co. of San Francisco, has been managed by Geo. E. Peoples of Coquille, and the immediate work has been under the supervision of J. H. Harbison of Gravel Ford, who is an experienced dairymen as well as a practical creameryman. Individual tests of cows have been made with the result that a number of dairymen propose to get rid of unprofitable cows and substitute therefor stock that will give first-class results in tests and the flow of milk.

At the opening of the season there was assurance of but 16 or 17 patrons but when the plant was opened there were 22 patrons on the roll.

"Queen Esther" May Come.

The very pretty musical opera entitled "Queen Esther" seems to have started on its rounds of the county, and we are told that it is not unlikely the play will yet reach Bandon. It was first put on at Marshfield and drew very large audiences for two successive nights. Next it goes to Coquille, and of the approaching operative treat the Sentinel has this to say:

Martin E. Robinson, a musician of ability, has been engaged by the school board of Coquille to organize a chorus of musicians, and after proper drill present the noted and popular opera "Queen Esther." The vocal talent of this city will be utilized and a grand success may be looked for. The object of this venture is to give the young people of the school the benefit of the drill, and to obtain funds to purchase many things that are needed at the school building. It will be a reproduction of the play put on successfully at Marshfield.
