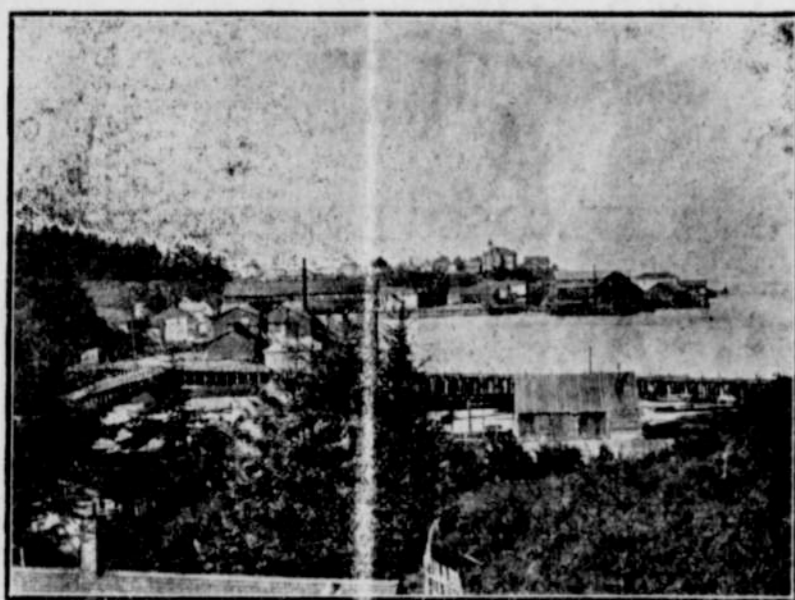

### More Rolling Stock Arrives.

The steam schooner Thos. L. Wand arrived at Marshfield one day last week, bringing 22 flat cars from San Francisco for the local line of the Southern Pacific company.

Some months ago an order for fifty flat cars, two locomotives and a passenger coach was placed with a railway supply firm by the county railroad. About two weeks ago three of the flats were received, and the latest shipment completes half the order for flat cars. It is expected that on the next trip of the Wand one of the locomotives and the coach will arrive. The balance of the equipment will be brought on a later voyage.

### Threaten the Chinese.

Down in Humboldt county, California, trouble of a high order has existed for some days as a result of the effort of a canning company to work Chinese in their cannery during the fishing season. The yellow man was expelled from Humboldt over 21 years ago, since which time he has never been allowed to regain a foothold there. Consequently when those 27 celestials were imported, even under the promise to take them away when the salmon period ended, there was an instant uprising of the people who declared they should never stay a week. The canning company protested, but the people, more especially organized labor, stood firm, and at latest accounts bloodshed seemed fairly imminent. Governor Pardee has been appealed to for troops to protect the threatened Chinese, against whom a few thousand determined wood and mill workers are moving menacingly. The outcome is anxiously awaited.

### The Origin of Oregon.

Periodically there appears a new version of the derivation of the name Oregon. Mr. Chas. Walkins of Portland gives us the latest. The late French-Canadian, Garnier, who served the Hudson Bay Company during many years under Dr. McLaughlin told me personally that the early Spanish navigators on this Pacific Coast gave the name "Big-ear" to the Indians.

The late Captain Ratcliffe of the Coquille River had one of those Spanish charts which were the first made of this coast. Now, as they visited this section many years anterior to the visit of Mr. Carver to the Shoshones, evidently he was not the first white man to use the word Oregon.

Big-ear in Spanish is Orejon; how simple, then, is the change from j to g. The Spanish word would, if my memory of the pronunciation is correct, be Oræone. It is a matter of no importance, still, the early navigators must be given some credit, and the change from Orejon to Oregon is simplicity itself.
