Chamber of Commerce Meets

The Chamber of Commerce held a special business meeting of its stockholders and directors at Geo. P. Topping's office on Tuesday evening. The matter of the site for the new mill of the Cody Lumber Co. was discussed and disposed of so far as any unfinished business was concerned. The deeds to the site have been placed in escrow and title cleared to the satisfaction of the Chamber, and the Cody company will become formal owners of the same when their mill is built and in operation. They are to begin preliminary construction work right away. Over \$1400 of the \$2000 required to buy the site has already been paid in, and every cent of the balance guaranteed.

The Chamber re-elected its old officers and directors, and voted unanimously to give the Governor and Senators a royal welcome and entertainment on the occasion of their early visit to this locality. Just when they will arrive seemed uncertain as we went to press today.

Matt Smith, foreman at the woolen mill, is congratulating himself just now that he is alive and able to tell his many friends how it all happened. Matt stood on the woolen mill dock Saturday evening busily engaged at some task when he accidentally stumbled and took a headed toward the briny deep. He landed on a fishrack with such force that three ribs were broken and his wrist and upper arm fractured. At first it was thought that the gentleman had been fatally hurt, but Dr. Houston so repaired him that he was able to be on the streets again Wednesday morning. It will be some time, however, before he has fully recovered from the accident.

Saturday was the banner day of the present fishing season on the lower river. Over 7000 fish were received the next morning at the cannery in Bandon, not to mention nearly as much delivered at the Prosper concern the same time. Holman & Patterson caught 1000 at one haul Saturday, but the greatest haul so far for this year was by Erickson Bros., who ensnared between 1600 and 1700 of the finnies into their seine at one sweep. A picture was taken of Ott Willard, his crew and their floating palace, the Antelope, together with two scows weighted with salmon, as the fleet came to anchor in sight of Bandon Sunday morning. The picture was a good one, but the camera succumbed to the awful bombardment.
