### Another Business Firm.

E. S. Hoover of St. John, Oregon, and H. A. Marston of Coquille, Idaho, are further additions to the business community of Bandon. These gentlemen came during the week ending Oct. 20th, and in two days thereafter they had secured an impression with the future prospects of the town they purchased the Bandon Meat Market from T. S. Anderson, and decided to locate permanently here. Accompanying Mr. Marston is his wife, who is a daughter of Mr. Hoover, and the latter gentleman's wife will come on a few days later to unite with the others. The market as purchased has been moved from the Anderson building to the rooms further south and opposite, in which the postoffice was formerly located.

In retiring from the business which he has so well conducted in Bandon, Mr. Hoover does not intend to leave Bandon, for he and his good wife will continue to reside here where they still have property interests. Messrs. Hoover and Marston are men of means and enterprise, and they intimate an intention of making additional investments in the town. The Recorder warmly welcomes them to the community.

The late Martha Francis Shaw, whose death is mentioned in our Bandon letter, she having died at her home at Four-mile Saturday morning after lingering illness, was born in Missouri on Nov. 25, 1825, and came to Oregon in 1869. Her father was Sullivan Fitzhugh, who was one of the framers of the constitution of Oregon, and Mrs. Shaw conducted the first hotel ever run in Marshfield, its being the third house erected in that place. She was twice married.

### Electric Plant Outlook.

The three months time given A. J. Burrows of Aberdeen, Wash., by the City Board for the beginning of construction of the local electric plant expired Oct. 20th, and Mr. Burrows failed to appear in person or communicate any reason for his procrastination. In consequence the Board has very properly declared the franchise forfeited, and determined upon the policy of exacting a bond of good faith from any future applicant for a franchise from this municipality. It is hinted on good authority that another party stands ready to install an electric plant in Bandon, and will make application to the Trustees for the necessary permit at the regular session to be held on Oct. 31st. The gentleman is Mr. F. H. Magoon of Portland, who has just finished installing a plant at Ranier, this State. Mr. Magoon very likely means business, as we all earnestly hope he does, but the Board will see to it that he or any other man is granted no concessions without a substantial evidence of his sincerity of purpose, and furthermore he must agree to commence work on his plant within 30 days after the franchise is obtained. Bandon should have long ago had an electric supply, and it would be a paying proposition for the outset.

The Trustees had a special meeting last Saturday evening, at which Rasmussen Bros. and Alvin Munck were each granted a renewal of their liquor licenses for six months. On Nov. 2nd the Board will meet to consider Walter Nelson's petition for a license, which, if granted, will give the town four saloons.

Daniel Boone and wife have given the City Restaurant, which they have leased, a thorough overhauling, and today noon opened up for business. They are both practical restaurant people.
