BANDON AND THE COQUILLE.

One of the very best evidences of the public confidence in Bandon's future is found in the fact that people both here and abroad are persistently investing in Bandon town property. Horace Greeley once said that he wanted no better assurance of the promised growth of a city or town than this, though such an expression is only as natural of utterance as it is correct in fact.

During recent months hardly a day has passed that our realty agents have not reported one or more sales of Bandon property, and the purchasers were largely residents of Coquille, Myrtle Point and Coos bay towns. The Wheeler Real Estate Company came among us in earnest less than one month ago, bought a tract of land in the southern limits of town, divided it into home sites, and started to place them on the market. Three weeks' time sufficed to retire the company from business so far as this tract is concerned, for every lot was disposed of in that period, and Mr. Wheeler tells the editor that not a few of his sales were made to Marshfield and North Bend parties.

If all this is not convincing that the public of Coos county have an abiding faith in the future of Bandon then we confess our mistake. It is a source of satisfaction to the Recorder to be able to know and chronicle these facts, and an additional pleasure that the town is reputed to possess a progressive, energetic and common-sense people who are ever alive to their very best welfare and financial interests.

It took but a little while for our substantial citizens to answer the appeal of the Cody company for a mill site, and, as one citizen remarked in our hearing, "we can repeat the deal whenever others offer enterprises to the town."

The Recorder is sincerely hopeful that the move to bring the three towns of this valley together in joint organization to fight for the upbuilding of Southern Coos will yet prove successful, and we know that Bandon is ready to do her share. There are several matters of importance to the whole valley that would claim the attention of such an organization, and we should get together as speedily as possible. The steamboat project can be worked up, we believe, and it is not impossible to raise funds by subscription for doing a little needed dredging on the river and eliminate the troublesome lagoon just inside the bar.

Coquille is once more a "wetter" town, Judge Burnett of Salem having decided that the late special election there, by which the people voted 100 to 20 in favor of the saloon, was illegal. As a consequence Baxter Bros. closed their resort Monday morning. If the short-sighted element of our sister town, who have thus gained renewed supremacy, think they have scored a point for temperance by this judicial edict they are decidedly in

error. Prohibition that prohibits is all right, but prohibition that is a farce is all wrong. Coquille will be "wetter," if anything.

Government geologists have been scouring the hills and mountains of Wyoming looking for what is called Niobrara shale, a deposit from which Portland cement is made. They have found it in abundance and cement plants are to be built. Why is it that no effort is made in this State to find similar deposits? Immense quantities of cement are used in this section, yet every pound of it must be shipped from Colorado or from the Missouri river. Freight rates are higher on the Pacific Coast than in any other part of the country, yet we must continue to pay tribute, when, if an effort were made, this necessary commodity might be manufactured here at home.

The report that President Roosevelt wants to be Senator from New York is revived. His friends say the President frankly admits that it is his ambition to succeed Platt. Roosevelt is becoming more and more the leader of the New York Republicans, and Tim Woodruff consults him on the conduct of the campaign almost daily, and other leaders submit their plans to Washington before doing anything. The President's friends declare he brought about the nomination of Judge Hughes without appearing to do so. President Stickney of the Great Western wants Roosevelt for another term in the White House.

Miss Ruth Hamilton, eldest daughter of Hon. and Mrs. J. W. Hamilton, whose marriage to Mr. Elbert Hermann, son of Congressman and Mrs. Binger Hermann, will take place at the home of the bride on the 24th of this month, was tendered a shower reception at the home of Mrs. W. R. Willis, in this city, Tuesday afternoon. The pleasant affair was held exclusively by the '95 Mental Culture Club of Roseburg, of which Miss Hamilton is the youngest member. The shower being of miscellaneous character, all sorts of useful and ornamental presents were tendered to the bride-to-be. The reception parlors were most inviting in floral attire, consisting of autumn leaves, ferns, roses and sweet peas. Refreshments were served.—Roseburg Review.

W. W. Holland launched the new boat he built at his yard for the Gardner Mill Company last week. She is a neat, trim craft of stanneh build and a credit to her designer. She has been named Juno, and will take the place of the old-time boat of that name on the Umpqua. The arrival of her machinery was delayed by the San Francisco fire, and it may be some weeks before it reaches here to be installed. The Juno is 62 feet long, 14 feet beam and 5 feet depth of hold, and is rated by those who know as the best built craft of her type ever constructed on the bay—Sun.

Owners of vessels, backed by the various associations of masters, pilots and engineers on the Pacific coast, are again talking of taking action to make it unlawful to tow rafts of logs and piling on the ocean from one coast port to another. There is no doubt but that the practice is dangerous to shipping when a raft breaks up at sea, which has frequently happened; but attempts heretofore made to have rafting on the ocean declared unlawful have proved abortive. Financially, the rafting scheme is a serious blow to shipping interests.

State Dairy Inspector P. D. McIntosh, who has been looking after dairy conditions in Coos county for a week, says that he finds a good many dairy barns in bad condition and urges compliance with the law in the interests of all concerned. Another official of the State may visit here next spring to enforce improvement if it has not been made before that time. He found one dairy farm, however, that he considers a model and the best conducted in the state.

City Recorder Roy R. Powder of Coquille City and Miss Lee Anna Gage, daughter of the county sheriff, were joined in marriage at the county seat a week ago.
