## Coquille Takes Initiative.

Coquille's Chamber of Commerce had a rousing meeting Monday evening, at which the Chambers of Bandon and Myrtle Point were asked to have delegations to the end that a joint organization of the three towns might be effected to enable persistent and effective work for the upbuilding of Southern Coos county. A banquet was a feature of the evening, and the occasion was one of marked pleasure and profit to all.

The Recorder is sincerely sorry that the full delegation intending to be present from Bandon was disappointed in its plans and endeavors. Arrangements had been made with the steamer Venus to convey Messrs Topping, Fredericks, Blamenrother, Trowbridge, Rasmussen, Denholm, Scotton, and possibly others of the local Chamber to the festive event, but at the eleventh hour the steamboat's captain declined because of an expressed fear of colliding with fish nets in the darkness. We are not a navigator, and not properly versed in the situation on the river, but it does seem singular that set nets are permitted to interfere with navigation on a navigable stream. Fishing is a legitimate calling, and we have a great deal of sympathy for the industrious and hard-working fisherman, but it must be there is a law giving some rights to traffic on a navigable river. If there is not, and the conditions were such as represented, then the Coquille Valley commercial organization has another matter, seemingly, to claim its earnest consideration. However, we were all at Coquille Monday evening in wish if not in reality, and it is to be earnestly hoped that much good came of the enthusiastic meeting. Our friends up there are assured that the next time they send us an invitation we will be on hand for certain in full strength, for Bandon is alive to the needs of this valley and the Coquille river. She is ready to do her full share in a steamboat to Portland project, or in any other enterprise that bodes well for Southern Coos and promises adequate returns on the investment. We are glad that a few of our energetic citizens succeeded in reaching the meeting by having sufficient spare time to enable them to leave in the afternoon.

Too late for our last issue we received a letter from Editor Dodge of the Sentinel apprising us of the approaching banquet and demonstration, but the fact was verbally communicated to other members of the Chamber here, and many began arrangements to be present. The letter stated that it was desired to bring the three Chambers of the valley together and work harmoniously for this valley's interests, not excepting the furtherance of the steamboat project and the securing of further aid for our river and bar. In all this Bandon of course is vitally and primarily interested, and it is not unlikely that we will soon have a meeting of our own, to which Coquille and Myrtle Point will be enthusiastically invited.

It is said that Coquille business men alone are good for about \$15,000 worth of stock in a locally owned steamer that will deliver them from the merciless extortions of the Southern Pacific Railroad in this county. If Myrtle Point could do about as handsomely we are convinced that the lower river and Bandon would subscribe the remainder for a \$50,000 ship because the venture would be an abundantly remunerative one.

There is food for congratulation in the fact that the three towns of this valley have laid aside any differences and, through their Chambers of Commerce, joined hand and soul for the betterment and advancement of Southern Coos. The Coos bay country works unitedly and effectively for their part of the county, which is only proper and to be expected, and it behooves us to be up and doing for our own section. If we don't do it who will do it for us? We have got one of the best regions of the Pacific Coast, but, like any locality, it needs improvement and advertising.

All hail to the new Coquille Valley Development League!

## Hearst's Election Seems Certain.

A dispatch from New York of recent date thus speaks of the gubernatorial fight in that State:

The first meeting of the newly appointed democratic executive committee was held today. W. R. Hearst was present. The committee organized and heard the reports from the various districts. These showed, it was stated, that Hearst was stronger up the state than was anticipated. The Tammany leader, Murphy, today predicted that Hearst would receive 74,000 majority in Greater New York. During the day Republican Chairman Woodruff talked with the republican chairmen from different parts of the state. Woodruff refused to make any statement. Hearst has offered \$5,000 for the arrest and conviction of any person guilty of mutilating a petition of the Independence League, while in possession of board elections. Hughes made several addresses in the southern tier of counties, and Hearst spoke several times in this city.

The Jewelers' Circular of recent date prints a half tone picture of the interior of Dr. M. G. Pohl's optical room with Mr. Pohl seated at his desk, and makes the following comment: "The accompanying illustration shows the optical parlors of M. G. Pohl, an optician of Myrtle Point, Oregon. Mr. Pohl is 71 years of age, but nevertheless is vigorous and robust for his age. Oregon is one of the Coast States which has laws governing the practice of optometry, and since this State has secured legislation almost numberless so-called "doctors" and "professors of optics" have been eliminated. The number of optometrists capable of passing the examination successfully at Salem, according to the list forwarded by the State Board of Examiners in optometry is at present 210. At the last examination only 16 out of 64 passed. The Circular is printed in New York and circulates all over the country, therefore Mr. Pohl and Myrtle Point feel honored at the attention received.

Banks other than national that are doing business in Oregon will be compelled to prepare and submit three statements of their condition each year, and will be examined annually by a State Bank Commissioner, when the new law now being prepared by a committee from the Oregon State Bankers' Association is enacted. No opposition to the bill is expected, and it is thought that if any changes are made in the act now being framed, they will be of a minor nature.
