## Warm Times in San Francisco.

Francis J. Heney Seeks to Land Boss Ruef in the Penitentiary.

Abe Ruef, who is perhaps the shrewdest but most conscienceless political boss of the Pacific Coast, stands some chance of wearing the stripes of a common felon unless present signs fail of fruition. Ruef has long had San Francisco in his grasp, and his power grew this year so that he is alleged to have controlled the late Republican Convention in California. A political bitter ness was engendered between him and the active District Attorney of San Francisco, W. H. Langdon, who is now the Independence League candidate for Governor, and in a sudden moment he got Langdon ousted from his office by an order of the acting Mayor, and he himself was named District Attorney. Langdon refuses to vacate, and the court is appealed to determine matters.

Francis J. Heney, the famous land fraud prosecutor of this State, has taken a hand in the fray in behalf of Langdon, and a bitter contest is on. Particulars of the fight are given in the following telegram to the Oregonian of Oct. 27th:

Trembling with passion, his voice raised to a high pitch, Francis J. Heney, the prosecutor of the grafters, leaned across the table in Judge Graham's court this afternoon and, shaking his finger in Abe Ruef's face, shouted:

"These are the men, these are the grafters we are after."

It was the concluding scene in the court drama in which Ruef and William H. Langdon had sought for recognition as District Attorney. Langdon, who was removed from office last night at the dictate of Ruef, refused to vacate the office. Judge Graham reserved his decision until next Mon-

Heney appeared in the capacity of assistant to Langdon. The removal of Langdon was ordered by Acting Mayor Gallagher when it was learned that Heney, assisted by Detective W. J. Burns and Langdon, had gathered evidence which they claim will send Ruef, Mayor Schmitz, Acting Mayor Gallagher and the 18 Supervisors to the penitentiary.

The day was replete with exciting episodes. A crowd of 300 people gathered about the courtroom, and when Ruef emerged, rushed at him and was only kept from doing him violence by the cordon of police which surrounded him. As it was, Dr. C. Beasley, an ex-Army surgeon, clashed with Ruef and the two engaged in a fist fight, but were soon parted.

Tonight Ruef and Langdon each claim that he is the rightful District Attorney. In case Ruef is sustained, he will endeavor to force Heney to divulge the evidence he has gathered. On the other hand Attorney-General Webb, of the State of California, appeared in court today in behalf of the people and stated that, if necessary, he would interpose and usurp the powers of the District Attorney. Afterward he stated that if Ruef were sustained as District Attorney, he would consider it his duty to assume control of the grand jury and have the charges against Ruef, Schmitz and the Supervisors investigated and prosecutions begun.

Ruef is fighting wildly to devise some means to force Heney to show his hand, but Heney refuses to disclose his evidence. Again and again he repeats that it will send all of San Francisco's city officials to prison, but he will not reveal the nature of the evidence collected.

Ruef's first act in court today was to appeal for protection. He stated that he had information that Heney was armed.

"The gentleman is incorrect, as usual," said Heney. The two men looked at each other, the crowd waited breathlessly, but there was no outbreak.

The mill in this city has been shut down this week in order to install a new edger and a new planer. The mill has for some time been in need of these two machines, and their arrival will fill a long felt want. The edger was manufactured by the Portland Iron Works, and is an 8x60, 5 saw and 4 saw battery and the latest improved machine. The planer was put up by the American Wood Working Machinery Company, of Aurora, Ill., and is considered the best on the market today. It is the latest model and a better constructed machine cannot be made. The mill company is composed of live, wide awake men who believe in good machinery, and they are making a success of the lumber business.—Sentinel.

The Coos Bay Times interviewed J. W. Nier, the Southern Pacific right-of-way agent, last week and learned that there was likely to be some difficulty about bridging Coos bay, as there was opposition springing up. It requires an act of Congress granting the privilege. "One thing is sure," said Mr. Nier. "Our company will not use a ferry, if it makes this the through line from Portland to San Francisco. But just what will be done, if opposition is found to the crossing of the bay with a bridge, I couldn't say."

A man giving his name as J. C. Collins was brought over from Marshfield by Marshal Carter Tuesday, and put in the county jail at this place. Collins is charged with having stolen a watch from the person of Cal Wright, of Marshfield, last Sunday, and was captured the next morning with the watch on him. He had a preliminary hearing Monday afternoon, and, after waiving examination, was bound over to the Circuit Court on failure to give bonds of \$500.—Sentinel.
