#### Port Orford.

Mrs. Sarah Kemp, a venerable pioneer, died last week at her son-in-law's in McMinville at the ripe age of 103.

Ed Heiberger is badly afflicted with rheumatism, and will probably visit some of the hot mineral springs before returning.

J. S. Capps, of Denmark, has purchased the Haft place which joins him on the East, and now has the making of a valuable farm.

The Cape Arago Light House at Coos Bay is in danger of tumbling into the sea, as the rock on which it stands is so badly undermined by the winter storms and seas.

Last Sunday a two-masted tug steamed in near Port Orford, having in tow a large three-masted schooner and a small one with two masts. They were strangers to us, north bound.

Fishing closed for the season at Rogue river last Friday after a rather light fall run, and Geo. Forty and Marion Zumwalt, who were employed at Wedderburn, have returned to Port Orford.

Dave McKenzie went to Bandon yesterday with a wagon load of butter which will be shipped to San Francisco from that place, as the transportation from Port Orford is very poor at present.

Mrs. Knapp left on Monday's stage for a visit among her friends on Coquille river. She certainly deserves a rest after her long effort to help make the Knapp hotel famous as one of the very best along our coast.

Late reports say that the wireless telegraph along the coast will be in operation in two months, and that our coast steamers will be equipped to hold communication with the shore. A station will be built soon at Cape Blanco.

A. C. Malone of Long Beach, Cal., who has been enjoying an outing in the mountains, left Port Orford Monday to visit friends at Coos Bay. Mr. Malone is an ex editor, and made many friends while here by his genial manners.

The work on the wharf is being rushed as rapidly as possible. Quite a number of dead cedar piles have been driven, it being held here by experienced men that such piles last several years longer than green ones, probably owing to the deep season checks, as the toredo never cuts into a crack, or into each other's cells.

An epidemic of filing contests on Indian Allotment Claims has broken out in Curry county. Quite a number of such contests have been started, and many horse races run from here to Roseburg to get papers to the Land Office first. It is claimed that only such Indians and half-bloods as belong to tribes or live on reservations are entitled to allotment claims.

The announcement by the Land Department that contest filings would be received on some half a dozen Indian allotment claims on Eucbre creek caused several of our young men to make a hurried trip to Roseburg last week. Three Wills—with but one will—Will Coy, Will Colebrook and Will White went via Myrtle Point, while Frank Moore went through the mountains to West Park. We understand that they all succeeded in starting a contest on some of this valuable land.

The purchase of the wharf here by R. D. Hume, and his promises of development here, have caused no end of discussion. If he will perform as he has promised he will receive a hearty welcome, and the cooperation of everybody. He can certainly help both himself and this community, and by giving regular and reasonable transportation he can draw back to Port Orford the Floras creek trade which now goes to Bandon, but belongs naturally to this place. Elk and Sixes are now full of salmon, the packing of which, in connection with his deep sea fishing, will create a large business and be of immense benefit to Port Orford. Let him establish a business era of reasonable charges, and he will find a welcome from all our people, but he can never control things here as effectively as he has at Rogue river, and we hope he will never try to do so.—Tribune.

Col. William Couch was on the Kilburn bound from Portland. At Astoria the steamer lay over Wednesday night on account of a storm at the Columbia bar. To put in the time the colonel got up a theatre party to see the Gans-Nelson moving picture fight. Colonel Couch did not agree with George Siler, but gave the decision to the Dope.—Coos Bay Times.
