**The Coquille Meeting.**

Of the meeting held at Coquille one evening last week for the purpose of bringing together the three towns of this valley to work harmoniously and jointly for the upbuilding of this valley, the Coquille Sentinel has the following to say:

The Coquille Board of Trade held a very interesting meeting last Monday evening, and had the pleasure of receiving visits by delegates from like organizations from Bandon and Myrtle Point, in response to invitations sent those bodies by the Coquille organization, and twelve earnest leading citizens of the Coquille Valley discussed matters of great importance to every merchant, farmer, lumberman, mechanic and laborer of this section of country.

The sea-going steamship so manifestly needed was one of the principal subjects discussed. T. B. Wheeler, delegate from Bandon, made a very enthusiastic address in favor of the people of the valley forming a company to build a vessel that would be suitable for the trade, and he earnestly urged that a joint committee be appointed whose duty should be to take preliminary steps in the matter. The gentleman was followed by other earnest speakers, and it was found that it was a consensus of opinion that people of the valley should take the matter in hand at once, and thus be enabled to ship their produce at the least possible expense. When it is realized that freight rates are so high that it prohibits the farmers shipping the great red apples that this country produces and many other products of the soil, it seems high time that the producers and tradesmen of this region should take advantage of the opportunity that nature has provided and shake off the restrictions to their prosperity. Other people begin to see their opportunity, and they are pleased to see some twenty-five successful business men meet and discuss a matter that carries with its success the welfare of such a productive valley as the Coquille. A committee of six, two from each Board of Trade, will be appointed by their respective bodies, and it is expected that they will accomplish the ends desired. It should be remembered that this move

is not for the purpose of antagonizing any other similar enterprise. The little steamer Elizabeth has done good service, but we must have enlarged facilities; it will stimulate coal mining, induce men to build mills, and enable gold miners to ship their ore. The latter industry is rapidly approaching the stage where it will soon be a leading feature, as recent developments and Government testimony. The merchants and lumbermen will then be able to receive goods in proper time without the necessity of waiting ten days or two weeks to have them brought from Marshfield, a distance of 18 miles.

The next very important subject discussed by the Boards of Trade was the matter of gathering statistics of the shipping industry of the Coquille, and preparing a petition asking Congress to make an appropriation to prevent the destruction of the Government jetty at the mouth of the river, and to blast out some rocks at the entrance and to do some dredging. It was estimated that \$30,000 would put our harbor in a permanent condition. The committee to be appointed are to attend to this important matter, and also take up the proposition of advertising more fully this section of Coos county.

The committee have a great responsibility upon their hands, and if they go to work with the determination the important duties require, and with a full confidence that they will succeed, there is no doubt but that the conditions of the valley will be much improved.

**The Elections.**

Elections were held Tuesday in 42 States of the Union, and the results have been eagerly awaited throughout the nation.

As we go to press there is not a full knowledge in Bandon of the outcome, though sufficient is known to make it clear that the Republicans have been generally victorious in the East and West, while the Democrats have used the broom effectively in the South.

The fight in New York between Charles E. Hughes, Republican, and William R. Hearst, Democrat, for the gubernatorial toga excited the greatest interest by far, and at this writing it would seem that Hughes had won out by about 40,000 plurality. All the larger cities, however, were carried by Hearst.

Throughout the South Democratic State and Congressional tickets have been elected by the usual majorities. New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Massachusetts, Ohio, Indiana, Iowa, Connecticut, Wisconsin, and other foremost States are decidedly Republican.

Minnesota re-elected her Democrat Governor with a whoop. Nevada is Democratic, but Utah, Wyoming and Washington are in the Republican column. Montana is probably Republican, Idaho Democratic and Colorado is in doubt. Democrats gain Congressmen in Missouri.

In California the reports would indicate that Gillett, Republican, has defeated Bell, Democrat, and Langdon, Independence League, for Governor.

Arizona defeats Joint Statehood for herself and New Mexico.

The Republicans of the 42 States involved are estimated to have chosen 114 Congressmen and the Democrats 91.
