## Bandon Vicinity Gets Shipyard.

### J. H. Price Chooses Location that Offers Better and Cheaper Facilities.

Some weeks ago the RECORDER told its readers that Mr. J. H. Price of San Francisco visited Bandon to look over the field with the object of starting a shipyard here. The gentleman tarried with us a day or so, and then went away, and it was reported he was investigating whether superior inducements were not offered his venture on Coos bay.

If this was the purpose of his going he evidently was deceived, for he has now returned and declared his intention to settle on the lower Coquille. He arrived in Bandon Tuesday evening, and with him came a force of eight ship-carpenters, mostly from Eureka, and a gentleman and his wife from some other outside point.

Mr. Price comes to begin business immediately. That business is to be located here because this section offers the suitable lumber more handily and economically than Coos bay, and he has something to do at the beginning of his venture.

The yard will eventually have its scene in Bandon, but for the present, until the site can be determined upon, it will be located at the Carman-Crites mill, nearly opposite Prosper.

An ocean lumber barge for the Cody Lumber Company will be the first construction work of the new yard. At least such is the report in circulation, and it is quite well verified. The crew is getting ready to put the

yard in shape, and it is said more men will be put on.

The Cody Company will send its output to market by the barge route when the new mill, now constructing, is in operation, or the greater part of it will go in that way, it is understood.

And thus is an extraordinary period of activity in promise for the lower Coquille River.

### The Canneries.

The canneries at Bandon and Prosper are just now winding up their season's work. The concern at Bandon finished packing last Saturday, the final cooking being made at 2 p.m. Labeling and boxing are now claiming the attention of the force, though they are somewhat handicapped by a scarcity of labels which are slow in arriving. The Prosper cannery finished packing a little sooner than the one at this place, and, while it put up more cases of fish, they were chiefly half pound tins against full pound tins in the greater lot at Bandon. Altogether the season has been quite a successful one, and the operation of the canneries has put considerable money in circulation on the lower river. Another week will probably see the two crews departing on their return to the north.

## Work Begins on the Cody Mill.

### Foundation and Wharf Now Started, and Lumber for the Mill is Being Cut.

It is the happy privilege of the RECORDER to announce that work has at last begun on the new Cody mill in the eastern end of town, and will be rushed to completion with all possible haste.

The driving of spiles for the foundation and wharf began one week ago, the location being by the channel on the mudflats. About twenty spiles are driven per day, but when a more snaitable engine is procured for the driver this number will be materially augmented.

The Carman Crites will begin the task Monday morning of cutting the lumber with which the mill will be constructed, and in other ways have active preparations started for making a final reality of this long mooted enterprise.

It may be late in the spring before the mill is finished and ready for operation, but there is no longer a doubt that it will be humming by summer at the farthest, adding many more men and families to our present population.

So much for the known public spirit of the substantial citizens of Bandon!

One of the great social events of the season in Bandon comes off at Bank Hall next Saturday evening, Nov. 17th. We refer to the twelfth annual ball of Dolphi Lodge, No. 64, Knights of Pythias, arrangements for which have been going on extensively for several weeks past. Nothing has been left undone to make the affair a gigantic success, and if indications count for anything there will be a monster attendance. The floor will be ably looked after, the supper will be No. 1, and the music under the leadership of Prof. E. B. Kausrud cannot else than be top-notch. The Knights have had the RECORDER turn out some very beautiful dance programs with an embossed design of the order thereon. The grand march starts at 8:30 punctually.

The Bandon Foundry and Machine Shop expects to get moved into its new quarters before the first of the month, when it will be in the business heart of town instead of in the suburbs as at present. The foundry is going to have commodious quarters especially suited to its purpose, and one of the conveniences will be an electric plant to illuminate the entire building.
