Espee Seeks Street Franchise

The all-absorbing topic at Marshfield the past week appears to have been the effort of the Southern Pacific Railway Company to obtain a franchise for the laying of its tracks along the main street of that town. The railway of course is now building from Drain to Marshfield, and it is the purpose to bridge Coos bay provided the consent of the War Department is secured, which is a very important matter in the transaction, and is in itself precipitating some amount of opposition.

The questions of bridge and franchise have drawn out no end of discussion at the Coos bay town, and from appearances the railroad will not have the use of the main street at least, while it is doubtful if they get the privilege to bridge at the point desired.

Prominent among those who combat the Harriman company in this matter is Edgar L. Wheeler, the well known son of T. B. Wheeler of Bandon. In a communication published in the Daily Times Mr. Wheeler offers facts to prove that it would be a gigantic blunder to surrender the street to a corporation that shamefully misused every privilege given it in the city of Oakland, California, and he goes further with some sensible ideas as to the possible injury to shipping by even a draw bridge prominently placed across the bay. Another to take a firm stand in the negative was J. W. Bennett, but the Chamber of Commerce took active hold of the matter with the result that it was declared inadvisable for the town to meet the demands of the big corporation.

This is surely the proper time for Marshfield to be on her guard with respect to the granting of municipal rights and concessions, and she can gain many an object lesson from California towns that have suffered from their imprudence along similar lines. Mr. Wheeler was right in all his recitation of the costly experience had by the city of Oakland with the Southern Pacific railway corporation.

Coos Bay Bestirs Herself.

When the people of the esteemed Coos bay section become acquainted with the fact that we recognize there is a Coos County instead of a mere Coos bay in Southwestern Oregon they may hope to secure more sympathy and aid from the Coquille Valley in contemplated advertising projects. We do, however, admire the step taken by the Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce Monday evening last, as the same is told in the following taken from Tuesday's Daily Times:

"Last night's meeting of the Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce was one that will no doubt result in much good for Coos Bay. Five hundred dollars was subscribed in about as many minutes towards sending a delegate to represent Coos Bay at the Trans-Mississippi Congress to be held at Kansas City, the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, to be held in Washington, D. C., the first of December, and to remain in Washington long enough to see that Congress makes the needed appropriations for the improvement of the Coos Bay bar jetty.

"The matter of obtaining proper advertising for Coos Bay was entered into with some degree of interest. After some discussion Secretary Henry Sengstacken was authorized to write to the Chambers of Commerce in Empire, North Bend, Marshfield, Coquille, Bandon and Myrtle Point relative to getting up general advertising matter for the entire county. It is desired that a 20-page booklet be printed."
