## Roseburg Calls a Halt.

The position taken by the RECORDER last week in opposition to the further spread of the liquor business locally had the effect of calling forth many words of commendation from leading citizens of the community. To be sure there are some who are disposed to differ with us, setting up the claim that if we are to stop more saloons we should stop more stores and business in general from invading the boundaries of the town. To these friends we would say that our attitude on the saloon is one solely in the interest of the community's morals, and not inspired by a desire to protect the existing barrooms from further competition. Such was far from our thought and intent, and we will dismiss the matter as unworthy of added consideration. The liquor business in any town must be watched by the town and kept within a proper order of restraint, if the business is to exist there at all, for it is one not calculated to contribute to the better moral welfare, and is separate and distinct from other pursuits. We are convinced of the justice of our demand to stop the threatened influx of frozen-out saloon-keepers from the "dry" communities, and in support of our position cite the action taken but recently by the City Council of the city of Roseburg. One of the papers of that place says:

Roseburg is curbing the saloon. At the last meeting of the City Council resolutions were passed against licensing any more saloons in that city, which now has fifteen thrifty parlors of high and low degree, and made appear to be looking that way from the adjoining dry counties.

The retirement of Secretary Hitchcock as head of the Department of the Interior, and of W. A. Richards, former Governor of Wyoming, as Commissioner of the General Land Office, is believed to have been caused directly by revelations made in connection with the coal land frauds along the Union Pacific railroad. It develops that for three years the Interior Department had detailed information concerning these frauds, on which it failed to act. Almost a year ago a lengthy protest concerning these conditions was filed with Commissioner Richards. An instance which aroused some comment at the time was the creation of the Klamath Forest Reserve in northern California. This reserve, it was alleged, while saving much valuable timber, also included much land owned by the Southern Pacific through its grant of alternate sections. This land was absolutely worthless, covered with brush or barren, valueless for either timber or grazing. By getting rid of the land, which could not be sold or marketed, the road would save the taxes demanded by the State and secure good land in exchange.

The RECORDER hopes to see our Chamber of Commerce awaken to the necessity of taking early and decisive

action with reference to the steamboat and other questions of vital concern to the Coquille Valley. Coquille has already acted to the extent of appointing a committee to co-operate with like committees from Bandon and Myrtle Point for carrying out the preliminary details of an active campaign in behalf of Coquille valley and bar, and there is no possible excuse why our committee should not have been named before this. However, we are glad that our Chamber has pledged its aid in raising the money necessary to send Orvil Dodge to National Rivers and Harbors Congress, where he will press the claims of this section for another appropriation for bar improvement. Mr. Dodge has an extensive acquaintance in Washington, and his abilities and fidelity to Southern Coos county are not in the least to be questioned. Let us be doing on all matters of interest to this favored locality.

## The Sentinel Wearies.

The Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Trade in this place had a call this week from various localities in different States for literature describing this valley and its resources, but unfortunately there is nothing suitable on hand and the Board of Trade is sleeping. No life, no enterprise, not even a common interest in the welfare of this region is what keeps everything backward. No matter how many people wish to come and establish manufactories, we are obliged to ignore their call for information.

Some time ago the three Boards of Trade held a joint meeting, and they appeared very enthusiastic, and agreed to jointly appoint a committee to promote the interests of the country. They had a banquet, retired to their homes, and never fulfilled their promises. At least the Coquille Board of Trade President has not been able to drum up a meeting since. Mr. President, we move that you disband and let every one be for himself and the devil for us all.—Sentinel.

C. E. Zeek, one of Bandon's progressive citizens, was in Coquille Saturday, on his way home from the bay. Mr. Zeek is taking a great interest in the black sands as a mining proposition, and has great faith in the future of black sand mining.

Mr. Alfred Johnson left last Friday with his wife for San Francisco, where he goes for medical aid for Mrs. Johnson. She has had a sickness extending over a period of three or four months. Her many friends hope she may find relief and regain her former health.

A. J. Ferrin and family moved to Riverton Sunday, where Mr. Ferrin has accepted the position of sawyer in the mill at that place. The property has been shut down for some time, but a new management has taken charge who say it will run steadily hereafter.

Col. Coach, who has large interests in the Valley, and others have organized "The Coach Transportation Company." The principal object of the corporation is for the purpose of furnishing transportation for the products of the Coquille river valley, by ocean steamers. The capital stock is \$200,000, and \$100,000 of the stock has been subscribed.
