Editor Dodge Selected.

Orvil Dodge, editor of the Coquille Sentinel, spent Sunday evening in Bandon. Mr. Dodge is being actively urged as a delegate from Southern Coos county to the National Rivers and Harbors Congress which convenes in Washington during the early days of December. At this session the Rivers and Harbors Committee of Congress will listen to recommendations respecting appropriations for river and harbor improvements, and has promised to give the same full weight and consideration.
