Anderson's "Statement."

The RECORDER is confronted with a serious (?) task this week. It is that of responding to a platitudinous tirade which emanated from the pen of little Tommy Anderson of this city. The tirade in question appeared in the last issue of the Coquille Sentinel, and at 5 cents a line Tommy is out some six dollars in hard cold cash in addition to the six dollars paid to Town Recorder Rice a few days ago.

As a preface to our article we will say that Tommy first blundered in his selection of a medium for the parading of his thoughts before the eyes of a criticizing world. Well might he have saved that precious six dollars by bringing his article to the RECORDER office. We would have not charged him a cent, and would have published the article as he wrote it, with the reservation, however, of criticizing editorially its contents.

Nevertheless we are not begrudging the Sentinel the few dollars it has earned in a legitimate way, for it is perfectly legitimate to publish matter of this character at advertising rates. We are simply bemoaning Tommy's unnecessary expense, as well as his disposition to believe that a personal injury has been dealt him by the late articles in the saloon question appearing in the columns of the RECORDER.

But to come to a discussion of the subject in hand. To begin with, Tom Anderson had nothing to warrant him in rushing into print as he did. In all that we have said, his name nor that of Jack Tupper never once appeared, and we were simply taking the ground that the town should not be overwhelmed by put-out saloon keepers from adjacent "dry" places. If Anderson had taken the advice of one of our best known and most successful business men he would have disregarded our utterances so far as they individually affected him, and he would not have invited open criticism of himself and his silly tirade in the public print.

The RECORDER will say unequivocally and emphatically that no saloon keeper prompted any utterance we have made on the subject of the local liquor traffic. Our editorial columns are not for sale, and only honorable motives inspire any utterance we make. We have not, nor do we now entertain any malice toward either Jack Tupper or Tom Anderson, and if their water-front dram-shop is established with the sanction of the municipality we shall merely demand that no more be licensed to exist here. And the municipal license, too, should be raised immediately.

It is the generally adopted policy of up-to-date towns and cities to limit the number of their saloons as a stroke for better morals and minimized crime, and this solely was the object of the RECORDER in the stand it has taken. But we have dealt with the subject sufficiently, and shall now close our columns to further discussion of it, Tom Anderson and his brilliant (?) statements to the contrary notwithstanding.

The Bar and Highways.

The first question of importance to the people of Bandon and the Coquille country is that of bar improvement. This we believe is the paramount matter to lay claim to our consideration, for the lumbering industry—our chief industry—is steadily expanding on the river, and the means of getting to market freely and uninterruptedly is of vital concern. The RECORDER is devoutly pleased with the information reaching it that the approaching Congress will assuredly appropriate anew for Coquille bar, the opinion being advanced by Government officials that another appropriation is requisite both to protect the work already performed and to improve that work. The Bandon Chamber of Commerce has commendably answered the appeal to aid in sending a delegate to Washington to battle in behalf of our interests, for it must be admitted that some effort is necessary to make the matter secure. Orvil Dodge is the delegate selected, and we are confident his abilities and his wide acquaintance at Washington will materially help him in his object. With this matter disposed of there is another to deeply concern the people of Bandon. We refer to our wagon roads, their bad condition in winter and the necessity of more of them. To the south-east of us there is a broad extent of country that is tributary to Bandon, but which must throw much of its trade to other points because of the indirect and circuitous route in reaching this trade center. The RECORDER will have more to say with reference to our highways in a future issue.

Robert Frederick, Jr., has prepared and sent the Sentinel editor a splendid report of the commercial and shipping transaction over the Coquille bar. This will be used in Washington at the Rivers and Harbors Congress, and then before Rivers and Harbors Committee in the House of Representatives for the purpose of urging an appropriation for the bar at Bandon, and dredging the river.—Sentinel.

Mr. L. J. Simpson stated to a representative of the Sentinel last week that the proposition to place him before the people as a candidate for U. S. Senator was done without any authority from him, in fact, in the face of earnest protests from him, as under no circumstances could he accept a nomination for any office at this time.
