Wireless Station at Blanco.

Materials Arrive per Elizabeth, and Work to Begin in Earnest.

The Recorder has the positive information to give to its readers this week that Cape Blanco is to have a United States Wireless Telegraphy Station, and that as quick as human hands can install it.

The up-coming steamer Elizabeth last week touched at Port Orford and got off about 90 tons of freight for the new station, the lot including engines, boilers, telegraph apparatus, building materials and furnishings.

There also came on the boat Commander Geering and son from Mare Island, who will represent the Government in the construction work, and Y. M. Concanon, the contractor installing the plant.

In about a week a full crew of some two dozen men will arrive at Blanco from North Head cape where a station is also being put in. These men will work under Contractor Concanon, and the task of making Cape Blanco a Government wireless point will be rushed to completion with all possible haste.

Keel Laid for New Steamer.

E. T. Kruse Will Also Build Another Boat for Coquille Run.

At J. H. Price's new shipyard north of Bandon the keel is now being laid for a new steam steamer to belong, it is said, to the A. S. Estabrook Lumber Co. of San Francisco. The vessel will have a carrying capacity of 750,000 feet of lumber, be a twin screw, and run to this river presumably.

The Price yard presents a hive of activity these days. Much of the machinery to be used by it arrived on the last Elizabeth, and all of it should properly have come. Another vessel will probably be started on the stocks very soon.

At the new Dunn yard at Prosper nothing is doing as yet. Mr. Dunn is in San Francisco awaiting the arrival of his machinery from the East. He, too, will build one or more vessels when he is in readiness.

Captain Jensen of the Elizabeth brought the positive information this trip that E. T. Kruse, managing owner of that steamer, has definitely decided to build a second steamer for the Bandon-San Francisco route.

Just where it will be built is not certain, but perhaps here, and work will be started in the near future.

The new boat will be 60 feet longer than the Elizabeth, but of no greater depth of hold. The understanding is it will be a twin screw, and carry lumber, freight and passengers.
