"Agriculture Here, Shipping Over There"

The Coos Bay News, one of Marshall's oldest and best known journals, contained an article last week that in some respects was humorously at fault. In other respects, however, it was fair, and dealt justly toward the Coquille section of Coos county. We herewith reproduce the article in full:

In conversation last week with Editor Dodge, of the Coquille Sentinel, we asked him regarding some statements made in the Sentinel, in which it was alleged that parties on Coos bay had made remarks derogatory to the Coquille section, with the object of influencing new comers from visiting or investing in that portion of the county. He mentioned one or two names which had been quoted to him, and, as we suspected, they proved to be names of Johnny-come-latelys, who probably had never been over on the river. He admitted that he heard no such statement attributed to any of the older residents of the bay. Coos bay and Coquille sections are one county, and should work together in harmony. The agricultural portion of the county is on that side of the Isthmus, the shipping facilities are here. We need the Coquille products for local use and for shipping, and Coquille needs the bay for a market and the means of getting to market. With reasonable freight rates between the two sections an immense trade would be built up. We believe this will be accomplished either by land or water, in the near future.

As for the Recorder, we are not going to say that many of the Coos bay people are openly "knocking" this section, though there are a perceptible few of them who manifest any particular love for our prosperous locality. That a certain two or three over there have gone out of their way to give the Coquille a black eye we know to be a positive fact, just as Editor Dodge expressed himself in the foregoing interview, and it is not to our knowledge that the eyes referred to are all "Johnny-come-latelys."

But the News is charitable enough to say that the Coos bay and Coquille sections are one county, and should work together in harmony, which sentiment to right-thinking citizen will attempt to gain. It is an unfortunate condition in many localities that jealousies and strife should exist, and their existence only hinders instead of aiding the general development of the county at large.

To one assertion of our esteemed contemporary we are forced to take particular exception. It is that in which the shipping of the county is all claimed for Coos bay. The News man surely is not conversant with conditions on the lower Coquille else he would not have made so rash a declaration.

He should have been in Bandon last Sunday, for instance, and seen vessels crossing out laden with the product of our mills, and the trim steamer Elizabeth unloading tons of merchandise at the Bandon dock. Maybe it would cheer his good soul to see work rushing forward on addi-

tional mills and on additional shipyards that will add to the fleet running out of the Coquille. Again, we may show him soon that a second steamer for this route is under construction at one of our newly installed yards.

No, the Recorder doesn't concede for a moment that ALL the shipping of the county is on the other side of the Beaver Hill divide, though the agricultural center is truthfully on this side. Neither do we pretend to say that we have as good shipping conditions as are found at Coos bay, but will say that energetic effort will not wane until our river and bar are navigably improved, as they will certainly be in all justice and righteousness ere long.

Mrs. Parsons, wife of a Congressman and daughter of Henry Clews, the noted financier, has issued a book favoring "trial marriages" before final ones. Perhaps her theory might do no harm in the social stratum of the "400" in which the authoress was brought up; but we opine that "trial marriages" just for fun, would be such a pleasant pastime that, when one had learned the game, he would play nothing else.

Schmitz and Knof, the San Francisco crooks, are said to have been volubly thankful to a patient and indulgent Providence, as well as people, this Thanksgiving day. They were both enjoying the art of freedom.

Congress has begun its annual sitting, and the eyes of the nation are riveted hopefully upon our legislative body. The message of President Roosevelt is, as usual, a wise and patriotic document.

The State Swindled.

The State has lost in the effort to compel the Portland General Electric Company to pay over 10 per cent of the gross earnings of the Oregon City Locks from the year 1874 to 1894. Judge Frazer of Portland holds in favor of the company. The Attorney General no doubt will appeal from the decision. Meanwhile farmers of the Willamette valley will continue paying tribute to the Portland General Electric Company at the rate of 50 cents a ton on everything that goes out or comes into the valley.—Albany Herald.

Bryan to Visit Oregon.

An acknowledgment of the receipt of the box of Hood River apples sent by the Hood River Democratic Club to William J. Bryan has just been received by George D. Culbertson, secretary of the organization, from the Democratic leader, dated at Lincoln, November 10, in which he says:

"Upon my return home after the close of the campaign I find your box of apples and also your letter. I think your description of the apples cannot be questioned; at least I have never seen any surpassing them.

"Mrs. Bryan and I are very fond of apples, and we eat one together every night before retiring. She, therefore, joins me in thanking the club for their much appreciated courtesy.

"We may pass through Oregon in January, but we fear we will not have time to stop any place excepting Portland and Eugene. (I understand the State University is at Eugene.) Am very glad to hear of the re-election of Governor Chamberlain, and that you feel hopeful about the campaign of 1908."

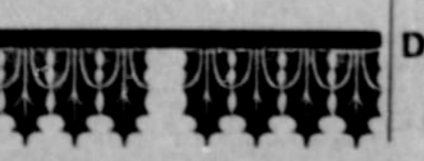
