Oregon Stands Pre-eminent.

Word from Salem is as follows: That the State of Oregon has not a dollar of debt of any kind, that every warrant has been paid when presented within the past two years, and that every county except Malheur has paid its State taxes when due, are facts set forth by the biennial report of State Treasurer Moore, which was made public today.

Rich Mine in Siskiyou.

A box containing 120 pounds of ore, worth \$7,000 in gold, was brought to Grants Pass, from the Siskiyou mountains by C. L. Mangum, president of the Grants Pass Miners' Association, and placed on display in the mineral exhibit room of the association. The gold is attracting much attention and creating no little excitement, as it comes from a new claim and a new district. It is undoubtedly the richest display of quartz ever exhibited in this city. The quartz is remarkable in that it does not come from a pocket vein or shallow formation, but from a well-defined ledge.

Many of the chunks in the box are half gold, and all of them are so thickly studded with gold as to allow the whittling of the yellow metal with a jack knife. In some of the places the gold occurs in high flakes or slabs large as a man's hand.

The owner is an eccentric miner, and has stood over his treasures with a rifle, keeping about \$60,000 worth of gold under the bunk in his cabin. Very little has been given out concerning the claim, other than it is near the Oregon-California line, and that it has been sold to an eastern syndicate for a fabulous sum. The new owners will give the property extensive development and shape it for operation on an immense scale.—Grants Pass Courier.
