Another New Mill.

The Recorder has been in possession of private information for some weeks that J. S. Lyons and C. C. Johnson of Coquille were considering the matter of building a sawmill on the lower waters of the river.

It is now our happy privilege to say that the plans of the gentlemen have fully materialized, and that work is to start on the plant within a week or ten days. The machinery, too, has been ordered.

The mill will be located near Bullards, but on the south side of the river, and a wharf must first be built. The lumber maker will possess a band saw and cut upwards of 60,000 feet per day.

The Town Fathers.

The Town Board of Trustees held a spirited meeting last Friday evening to consider the liquor license question, and it was unanimously voted to raise the license from \$400 to \$600 per annum. The matter brought out some discussion, and there were those who favored putting the figure at \$800 or \$1000. J. P. Tupper's petition to establish a saloon on the water front will be heard by the Board next Monday evening.

S. W. Scotton recommended that the Trustees formally express approval of the effort to induce Congress to appropriate for the improvement of this river and bar, and on motion the Board so acted, instructing Recorder Rice to communicate the fact to Delegate Orvil Dodge at Washington.

Important Realty Sales.

The Bandon Real Estate Co. effected two important sales last Friday, one of which is of particular consequence.

Four hundred acres of timber on Hall's creek was sold to Fred A. Krebs of Portland for \$20,000, quite a respectable figure.

The company also disposed of eight lots in Woodland Addition to D. McCarty, the architect of Portland who drew the plans for the new Cody mill now in process of construction. Mr. McCarty was instantly impressed with a promising future for Bandon.

Municipal Ownership.

The municipal body at its last regular meeting discussed the possibility of securing a good supply at fair cost and not distant, in the event of the town determining to build a water system of its own. As a result of this discussion Surveyor Chas. McCulloch was instructed to investigate the surrounding streams and make report at the next regular meeting.

Mr. McCulloch accordingly began his prospect of near by creeks last Monday, and he informs us that as far as he has gone he is uncertain the town can get that which it seeks—good water at a very fair pressure without great distance or excessive cost. When his report is completed the Recorder will give it merited publicity.

The local board has taken no decisive action with reference to a municipal water plant, nor has it announced its purpose to do so, but there seems to be a pretty strong feeling with our people that we could afford to own our water works and possibly a lighting system also.

The Recorder will not deal further with the subject until it more fully investigates it.

Another of the old pioneer settlers of Southern Oregon died at the home of a daughter in or near Hood River recently, in the person of Peter Raffner. In the olden time when Battle Rock was but a mole hill he went to Port Orford and engaged in the hotel business.

J. W. Clinton, the logger, was in town yesterday. Mr. Clinton is looking for a line 3000 feet in length to be used in his new camp where something will be doing in a short time—Herald.

Notice of Street Improvement.

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Trustees of the Town of Bandon, by order duly passed by said Board and entered of record in the journal of its proceedings on the 20th day of November, 1906, proposes to improve and repair Atwater Street in the Town of Bandon, County of Coos, and State of Oregon.

The Board proposes building a new bridge on said street from the intersection of First Street east along said Atwater Street to intersection of Little Street, and proposes to build said bridge to conform with the lines of said street.
