Notice of Street Improvement.

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Trustees of the Town of Bandon, by order duly passed by said Board and entered of record in the journal of its proceedings on the 20th day of November, 1906, proposes to improve and repair Atwater Street, in the Town of Bandon, County of Coos, and State of Oregon.

The Board proposes building a new bridge on said street from the intersection of First Street east along said Atwater Street to intersection of Little Street, and proposes to build said bridge to conform with the lines of said street.

And notice is further given that unless two-thirds of the property owners residing on such part of Atwater Street herein given file a written remonstrance with the Recorder of the Town of Bandon within 10 days from the final publication of this notice which final publication is the 6th day of December, 1906, remonstrating against the proposed improvements, an Ordinance will be passed by the said Board of Trustees appropriating funds for the planing of the said bridge, and for an assessment on the adjacent property owners for all such work, and the carrying out of said work in the manner required by law.

President's Message.

The annual message of President Roosevelt to the national Congress, now in session, is a lengthy document as usual. Perhaps no question will which it deals attracts more interest and comment relative to the President's attitude thereon than the Japanese question. In California particularly the President is roundly denounced, and the press unhesitatingly says that it would be suicide for the Republican Party to condone Mr. Roosevelt's utterances. There are those, however, who defend him on the ground that he is misunderstood, but the large majority reject any defense. Following are the points of the message in abbreviated form:

Reckless speculation and disregard of legitimate business only possible cause of ruining unprecedented prosperity.

Recommends prohibition of corporations contributing to campaign expenses.

Suggests enactment of law in connection with issuing of injunctions.

Condemns the practice of lynching as a crime loosening the bands of civilization.

It is recommended that the public coal lands be withdrawn from settlement.

Marriage and divorce question should be relegated to the National Congress.

Sinking birth rate is given as the one sin for which the penalty is national death.

Urges that the matter of development of American shipping be advanced.

Complete reorganization of the government of Alaska need d at once.

Hope of peace and order in Cuba at close of Provisional Government is expressed.

It is held that the Government should supervise business so it will be conducted in the interest of the nation.

Currency reform plans are suggested to Congress.

Lower tariff or absolutely free trade with the Philippines is recommended.

Administration of the insular possessions should be under one executive department.

Better education is advocated for the farmer of the country.

Income and inheritance tax is advocated by the President.

Asked that Japanese be given same fair treatment accorded other foreigners.

Laws regulating the fur seals are declared to be inadequate.

Death of Joseph White.

Joseph White was born in Penn. Feb 9th, 1842. Left an orphan at an early age, he made his home mostly with an uncle in Illinois. He volunteered as a soldier in the Civil War at the age of 18, and it was there, enduring the many hardships of war, that his life was greatly shortened.

After the war was over he received an honorable discharge, and returned to Ill. to wed Miss Leah Norris. Of this union 9 children were born—5 girls and 4 boys, all of whom survive him. They came to Oregon in 1894, where deceased has since lived, loved and respected by all who knew him.

Mr. White professed religion at an early age, and has never faltered nor stepped aside from that straight and narrow path which he knew led to Life Eternal.

A little over two years ago he suffered a severe attack of lung fever, since when he has gradually grown weaker, but so patiently did he bear his cross that only those who knew and loved him best realized what he suffered.

He was in the bed about 21 days, and, surrounded only by his faithful wife and loving children, on Dec. 6th at 8 o'clock p.m., calmly and peacefully, with a smile on his lips, fell asleep. The funeral occurred two days later.
