Our Delegate Writes.

Secretary Robt. Frederick of the Bandon Chamber of Commerce is in receipt of a letter from our delegate to the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, Mr. Orvil Dodge of Coquille. The Secretary has handed the letter to the Recorder for publication. It speaks for itself and is as follows:

Washington, D. C., Dec. 9, '06.

Robt. Frederick, Esq.,
Sec'y Bandon Chamber Commerce,
Bandon, Oregon.

Dear Sir:

You can say to your Chamber of Commerce that I have the assurance in the word of Mr. Burton, chairman of the Rivers and Harbors Congressional Committee, that the Coquille shall receive attention. That gentleman has given me one bearing and promised me another, at which time he requested me to file a "brief." I have not heard of the papers you sent to Portland. I called on the Chief Engineer yesterday to see if he had them, but nothing had reached that office.

The Chief presented me with a copy of the Engineers' report on the Coquille. I shall address Mr. Burton and file the brief as well as the statistics regarding the amount of shipping, etc.

I feel certain that the Coquille bar would have fared poorly if some one had not been here to look after its interests. This I will explain orally when I come home. Jonathan Boone is here and is giving me every help possible. Gearin and Fulton promise the same. Yours truly,

The Coos Bay News seems to think that the Recorder failed to grasp the idea of the News with respect to its recent article about the Coquille country, our dependence (?) on Coos bay for shipping, etc., etc. Well, it is to be hoped we did get the wrong meaning, for, as interpreted, we could see little chance for our future well-being without courting Coos bay as our commercial outlet. However, the News in elucidating its thoughts takes a reasonable and common-sense stand that appeals very forcibly to the average reader. That the upper Coquille country is the agricultural section, that it depends for a market on Coos bay in a great measure, and that the merciless extortions of the Espee Railway are dealing a hardship to the agriculturalists there, are all facts to be promptly admitted. But if a way cannot be found to force the railroad to fairness the up river producers might seek their relief in this direction, and it is probable they could reach a profitable market via the Coquille bar. If not, we cannot see why another season should not give them a very fair market for their fruits and vegetables on the lower Coquille, considering the rapid growth of lumbering and ship building in this favored locality. There seems at least some hope for the misused farmer and fruit-grower if the railroad

continues to bleed them as at present. But the Recorder is pleased that the News finds pleasure in noting the improvements in shipping facilities here and waits the hope over to us that the improvement will continue until it meets the expectations of the most ardent advocate of the prosperity in store for the city-by-the-sea. Many thanks for such a Christmas greeting!

North Bend and Marshfield are debating the advisability of consolidating the two places. We have not noted as yet that they plan taking in Coquille, Bandon and all the "Coos Bay country," but have heard that Bandon thought favorably of merging Marshfield and North Bend into a greater Bandon.

Senator Gearin of Oregon has formally declared himself in favor of Japanese coolie exclusion by the introduction of a square-toed measure in the upper house. Gearin is on the right tack, but he will hardly win.

I have recently heard something of your country, and the glowing prospects you hold out, so I take the liberty of writing you for a little more general information.

At present I am in the undertaking business, and have been for ten years, but I find it a little wearing on me physically. It is too high here for my family, so I have about decided to try different lines and different climates.

Can a man of very limited means come to your country and make a living and more? I know what you want is great capital to develop your wonderful resources, but you will need also a number of people with less money.

What does it cost to live out there? board, house rent, groceries, meats, fuel, etc? What salaries or wages are the most commonly paid for clerical, indoor or outdoor work, and can a person readily find work to do? Are you crowded with Japs and Chinese? During the rainy season is it almost continuously cloudy and rainy? How low does the thermometer go (sometimes) with you, and do the cold spells last long?

I have great faith in the Northwest States, and that is one reason why I am becoming interested in Coos County. Send me a late paper and any other information, for which I thank you.
