Stop Gasoline Duck Hunts.

Sneak boats, swivel guns and numerous other destructive agencies to his "duckship" were prohibited in the late game laws, but what is doing more by far to exterminate the festive and fleet-winged bird in this section—the gasoline boat—was omitted.

More ducks are being driven out of the country by use of the latter than all the other devices that could be improvised. It is no uncommon occurrence to see a bunch of dead game sports mounted on the deck of a gasoline launch at high tide and in pursuit of a flock of ducks. They are chased from one end of the bay to the other, and ultimately depart for fields green and pastures new, where they can escape the ceaseless "bang" from the gasoline sportsmen. It seems strange, but ducks have no fear of the approaching gasoline launch, and large bags are secured in this manner. Then, too, the great objection to this mode of hunting ducks is the amount of territory covered in a single day's sport.

The Legislature this winter will be petitioned to prohibit this mode of hunting, and it is earnestly hoped that our law makers will heed the prayer of the people. If we are to preserve these birds for the future, the gasoline hunter will certainly have to be eliminated.—Coos Bay Sun.

Local Telephone Exchange.

Gregory, representing the telephone company, have been in Bandon the past week making arrangements to install a complete and up-to-date telephone exchange, and they propose to install telephones in all of the business houses in Bandon, as well as in all of the principal residences.

"We are meeting with very good success," said Mr. Robertson, Tuesday, "and so far every business place with one exception has ordered a telephone, and a great many residences are to be connected. If we can secure a hundred subscribers in Bandon we will put on a continuous day, night and Sunday service."

There will be service from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. until the exchange is all installed.

The farmers and mills south of Bandon are making arrangements to build lines into the exchange, as well as the Bear Creek, Prosper and Bullards districts, some sixty in all.

Bandon will have a telephone exchange when completed that will be second to none in proportion to the population.
